Out With The Old In With The New

Alexander's Lewis And Clark Trail Museum Plans To Introduce An Agricultural Education Area To The Museum Grounds

The Lewis and Clark Trail Museum will be implementing a project, starting this spring. The finished project will give visitors an insight into the type of crops that would have been planted around Alexander when the town was first established.

The idea to start this project was a joint effort between the Williston Research Extension Center staff, the museum board, and the Natural Resources Conservation Service staff.

On the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum grounds, there will be a kiosk containing information on crops that will be planted, which would be durum, spring wheat, barley, oats, canola, peas, lentil, soybean, flax, corn, and sunflower. Natural Resources Conservation Service staff and Cameron Wahlstrom and Meredith Miller (staff at the Williston Research Extension Center) will help plant and harvest the crops.

'The intended purpose is to have demonstration strips that will give museum visitors a visual representation of crops typically grown in North Dakota. There is a large disconnect between people not involved in agriculture and farmers who are currently producing the products we enjoy. The purpose of this project is to show people what their favorite food products look like in the field, and before they are processed," explained Justin Jacobs, an Irrigation Research Specialist at the WREC who is helping plan the project.

Cathy White, the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum Director, said, "Our goal is to encourage visitors to visit the outside of the

museum and look at some of the old farm equipment that will be outside as well. We want to give visitors and people who are new to North Dakota the opportunity to see what type of crops we grow here and to also learn a little bit about them.'

White also explained that there would be a cover crop and possibly some trees added to the grassy area outside of the museum. "We were also thinking about possibly putting a bench on the outside area and dedicating it to Alf R. Flaten, who was the Superintendent of the Alexander School in the early days," added White.

The crops will be planted where the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum's Alexander School gymnasium was located. The gymnasium, attached to the original 1914 three-story schoolhouse, was recently taken down due to continuous water issues. These water issues were caused due to the gymnasium being built underground. The gymnasium was built four feet below ground level, the locker rooms were located eight feet below ground level, and the boilers in the boys locker room were placed an additional two feet lower than that, which contributed to all the water damage the building experienced.

Many people who attended community and school events at the gymnasium called the structure a "state of the art building in its day." Even though the building held a lot of sentimental value for many people - everyone is excited to see an agricultural education area put in place of where it used to stand.







Montana FSA: USDA Has Opened Signup For Conservation Reserve Program On Dec. 9

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced the U.S. Department of Agriculture is opening signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) on December 9, 2019. The deadline for agricultural producers to sign up for general CRP is February 28, 2020, while signup for continuous CRP is ongoing.

Farmers and ranchers who enroll in CRP receive a yearly rental payment for voluntarily establishing long-term, resource-conserving plant

species, such as approved grasses or trees (known as "covers") to control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat on marginally productive agricultural lands

"The Conservation Reserve Program is one of our nation's largest conservation endeavors and a critical tool to help producers better manage their operations while conserving natural resources," Secretary Perdue said. "The program marks its 35-year anniversary in 2020, and we're

CRP has 22 million acres enrolled, but the 2018 Farm Bill lifted the cap to 27 million acres. This means farmers and ranchers have a chance to enroll in CRP for the first time or continue their participation for another term.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest private-lands conservation programs in the U.S. The program was originally primarily intended to control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. This Farm Bill program has evolved over the years, providing a variety of conservation and economic benefits from coast to coast. CRP has:

- Prevented more than 9 billion tons of soil from eroding, enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks;
- · Reduced nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95 and 85 percent respectively;
- · Sequestered an annual average of 49 million tons of greenhouse gases, equal to taking 9 million cars off the
- · Created more than 3 million acres of restored wetlands while protecting more than 175,000 stream miles with riparian forest and grass buffers, enough to go around the world 7 times; and

· Benefited bees and other pollinators and increased populations of ducks, pheasants, turkey, bobwhite quail. prairie chickens, grasshopper sparrows and many other birds

By enrolling in CRP, producers are improving water quality, reducing soil erosion, and restoring habitat for wildlife. This in turn spurs hunting, fishing, recreation, tourism, and other economic development across rural America.

CRP Enrollment Options General Signup

CRP general signup will be held annually. The competitive general signup will now include increased opportunities for enrollment of wildlife habitat through the State Acres For Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) initiative.

Continuous Signup While some practices under SAFE will remain available through continuous signup, CRP continuous signup will focus primarily on water quality within the Clean Lakes, Estuaries, and Rivers (CLEAR) Initiative. The 2018 Farm Bill prioritizes water quality practices such as contour grass strips, filter strips, riparian buffers, wetlands and a new prairie strip.

USDA will also be working with Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) partners to relaunch CREP continuous options in each state under new statutory provisions. CREP will continue to target high-priority local, state or regional conservation concerns.

Grasslands Signups

CRP Grasslands signup helps landowners and operators protect grassland, including rangeland, and pastureland and certain other lands while maintaining the areas as grazing lands. A separate CRP Grasslands signup will be offered each year following general signup. The sign-up period for CRP Grasslands in 2020 runs from March 16, 2020 to May 15, 2020.

Pilot Programs

Later in 2020, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will roll out pilot programs within CRP: CLEAR 30, which allows contracts expiring with CLEAR practices to be reenrolled in 30-year contracts and in the Soil Health and Income Protection Program (SHIPP) in the prairie pothole region. More information on these programs will be announced in the new year.

Land Transition

The CRP Transition Incentives Program (TIP) is an option for producers interested in transitioning land to a beginning farmer or rancher or a member of a socially disadvantaged group to return land to production for sustainable

grazing or crop production. CRP contract holders no longer need to be a retired or retiring owner or operator to transition their land. TIP participants may have a lease less than five years with an option to purchase, and they have two years before the end of the CRP contract to make conservation and land improvements.

Previously Expired Land Land enrolled in CRP under a 15-vear contract that

expired in September 2017, 2018 or 2019, may be eligible for enrollment if there was no opportunity for re-enrollment and the practice under the expired contract has been maintained.

CRP Rates and Pay-

FSA recently posted updated soil rental rates for CRP. County average rates are posted on the CRP Statistics webpage. Soil rental rates are statutorily prorated at 90 percent for continuous signup and 85 percent for general signup. The rental rates will be reviewed annually. Under continuous signup, producers also receive incentives, including a signup incentive payment and a practice incentive payment.

More Information

CRP marks its 35-vear anniversary in 2020, and FSA will continue to highlight the impacts of the program that was created in 1985 and the many stewardship-minded farmers, ranchers and landowners who have participated over the years.

higher in crowded public areas and living quarters. Persons begin to show symptoms within a week of being exposed to the virus.

Richland County Health Department wants residents to know there is time to get a flu shot from the health department, local healthcare provider or pharmacy.


Vaccination remains the best prevention for influenza and influenza related complications. Influenza vaccine is recommended for everyone from ages 6 months and older. Persons who have any chronic health condition (diabetes. heart disease, cancers, immune suppressed, pregnant, have compromised lung/respiratory diseases, etc.,) are at higher risk of complications from influenza illness and are strongly urged to get yearly influenza vaccinations. Most of the Influenza vaccine for this 2019-20 season covers two Influenza A strains (Seasonal

H3 and 2009 H1N1) and two influenza B strains (Phuket -Yamagata lineage; and Colorado- Victorian lineage.)

In addition to vaccination please take precautions to limit the spread of disease, including:

- · Wash your hands thoroughly and frequently;
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing;
- · Stay home from work, school, daycare and large gatherings when you're sick; · Get plenty of rest; and
 - Eat nutritious foods and

Changing Dirt Into Soil – Soil Health Workshop, Dec. 18, Williston

Producers across northwestern North Dakota and northeastern Montana who are interested in soil health are invited to participate in a workshop on "Changing Dirt in Soil" on December 18, 2019 at the Williston Research Extension Center. The workshop, which will start at 8:30 a.m. Central time, is being sponsored by the Williams County Soil Conservation District and Natural Resources Conservation Service.

One of the featured speakers for the workshop will be Jay Fuhrer, Soil Health Specialist with the Natural Resource Conservation Service.

On a Soil Health Tour this summer to Brown's Ranch, Menoken Farm and Dakota Lakes Research Farm that was sponsored by several of the Soil Conservation Districts in northwestern North Dakota, one of the common messages was the importance of increasing the amount of carbon in the soil to improve soil health. Jay will talk about the carbon cycle and how to increase carbon in the soil.

Jay is widely recognized for his work on soil health principles and has been boots on the ground for many years working with cropping systems, grazing systems, cover crops and gardens. However, this may be one of the last opportunities to hear Jay speak as after 40 years of working for NRCS, he has announced his plans to retire in January of 2020.

Another featured speaker will be Derek Axten. Axten and his wife, Tannis operate a diversified farm near Minton in southern Saskatchewan. Located not far from the Montana and North Dakota borders with Canada, the Axtens face the same challenges with the shorter growing season and routine lack of

moisture as producers in this area.

Since learning about soil biology and how soil functions, the Axten's have become "Loyal to the Soil" and have implemented innovative ideas to improve their soil health and regenerate their farmland. Derek will talk about the systems approach they have used to improve the sustainability, profitability and productivity of their farm using practices such as no-till, intercropping, cover crops and livestock integration.

Keith Brown, Williams County SCD Soil Health & Cropping System Specialist, will walk participants through the Web Soil Survey. The Web Soil Survey provides useful soil data and information that can be accessed by anyone with a computer and Internet access. It is operated by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service. He will also talk about tracking soil health to document improvements for potential paybacks.

One of the five soil health principles is plant diversity. A strategy to add more diversity that some producers are exploring is intercropping. Justin Jacobs, Irrigation Research Specialist with the Williston Research Extension Center will provide an update on intercropping research being conducted at the WREC.

In the long run, you will also lower your chance of getting lung cancer and other cancers.

Tester Urges USDA To Act On Northeast Montana Wheat Crisis

Senator: Recent, heavy snow qualifies Northeastern Montana farmers for WHIP+ assistance

(U.S. Senate) - Following two weeks of heavy snow in Northeast Montana, U.S. Senator Jon Tester urged Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue to reconsider his decision not to extend disaster assistance to the region's wheat farmers who were forced to leave their crop in the ground or were left with unsellable product due to excessive moisture this harvest season.

"In the last two weeks, Northeast Montana received more than a foot of heavy, wet snow...The Additional Supplemental Appropriators for Disaster Relief Act of 2019 (H.R. 2157) extends the [Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus] to expenses related to losses of crops as a consequence of 'hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, typhoons, volcanic activity, snowstorms, and wildfires.' The language in this bill could not be clearer, and as such I urge you to act on it immediately and extend WHIP+ assistance to these producers."

In September, Senator Tester sent Secretary Perdue a letter asking the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to clarify that the Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus (WHIP+) includes value and quality losses, and that farmers in Northeast Montana facing those losses were eligible for the program. Nearly eight weeks later, USDA finally responded that they would not provide WHIP+ assistance to Montana farmers.

"I am extremely disappointed in your decision to exclude Montana farmers from the WHIP+ program for quality loss related to excessive moisture," wrote Tester in his letter this week. "In a time of extreme market volatility and trade uncertainty, USDA's mission is to 'mitigate the significant risks of farming.' In Northeast Montana, USDA is failing to deliver that objective for struggling farmers.'

As the only working farmer in the U.S. Senate, Tester has been a champion for farmers and ranchers across the country. Earlier this year, he introduced his Seeding Rural Resilience Act to help combat rising rates of farmer suicide, and The Trump Administration recently adopted his Restoring Rural Residencies Act into a rule change to bring more medical professionals into rural hospitals.
