Hystad's 2022 Alexander Old Settler's Day Honorees Sept. 1-3

Dallas was born on Nov. 14, 1919 to Henry and Emma Pagel Hystad at their home in the Farland community. He graduated from Watford City High School and attended North Dakota State School of Science in Wahpeton. After serving in the Army Air Force for over 3 years in World War II, he came back home and purchased his farm/ranch in 1947.

Phylis was born on July 14, 1928 to Harold and Elsie Gessner Lynner in Watford City. She was second born of 5 siblings. She attended grade school at the Braaten and Roalsvig schools south of Arnegard and graduated from Arnegard High School in 1946. She received a Teacher Certificate from Minot State and taught rural schools for 4 years.

Phylis and Dallas were married on June 20, 1948 at the Zoar Church south of Arnegard. They moved to his farm/ranch north of Arnegard where Dallas resided until

until 2015 when she moved to Williston. On the farm/ ranch, they raised Simmental cattle, quarter horses, small grains and hay. In 1964, Phylis started working for the ND Statistical Reporting Service and worked for them for 23 years. She was the first woman in North Dakota to work for them. She also compiled a book called "The Final Resting Place". It is a complete record of all the cemeteries in McKenzie County. She also worked to get markers on the unmarked graves.

Phylis has been active in the VFW Auxiliary, McKenzie County Historical Society and the Women of the Moose. She enjoys cooking, baking, entertaining, crafts, quilting, genealogy, and traveling in the U.S.. Norway and Europe. Through the vears, she was active as a 4-H leader and helped many youth with their projects, including her grandchildren.

Dallas was one of the founders of the North Dakota


They both especially liked spending time with their grandchildren.

Solutions out of Billings and we will host a joint event with the Town of Fairview. Collection times for the weekend event in Sidney are from 3-7 p.m., Friday Sept. 9, and 8 a.m.-noon, Saturday, Sept. 10. The collection site will be at the Richland County Shop, right next to the fairgrounds.

Fairview's collection event is on Saturday, Sept. 10, 10 a.m.-noon. The Fairview location will be at the

water station on 9th St. As in past years, local businesses, hospitals, school and other agencies and organizations with large amounts to e-cycle are asked to make an appointment by calling Luinstra at the Richland County Health Department 406-433-2207 or emailing heather.luinstra@richland.org.

Now in its 18th year, the event is open to area residents throughout the Mon-Dak. The volunteer E-rase your E-waste program has recycled more than a half million pounds of damaged or obsolete electronics from this area, helping to preserve the life of the local landfill, and to protect the health of local citizens and the environment.

Fatal Motorcycle Crash Near Trenton, ND, Aug. 20

On Aug. 20 at approximately 3:32 p.m. CDST, a 2014 Harley Davidson motorcycle, driven by Lonnie Paul Brannin, Williston, ND, was northbound on ND 1804, near mile marker 335, approximately 5 miles west of Trenton, ND. to the Lower Yellowstone project is still ongoing in the area. Joe's Island is expected to remain closed to the public through the Fall and Winter of 2022 when all construction related activities are scheduled to be complete.

"For safety reasons, recreationists and other members of the public should avoid the area, which is still an active construction zone," Ryan Newman, Montana Area Manager said. "When the island is re-opened, we will issue a public notice."

Contractors are still present on Joe's Island to address several areas of erosion and to fix the main access road on the east side of the bypass channel. All work along Highway 16, the Canal Road, and in the Intake FAS area on the north side of the Yellowstone River is complete.

The Lower Yellowstone Project is a 58,000-acre irrigation project located in eastern Montana and western North Dakota. The project is operated and maintained by the Lower Yellowstone Irrigation District Board of Control under contract with Reclamation. The project includes the intake diversion dam, a screened headworks structure, 71 miles of main canal, 225 miles of laterals and 118 miles of drains, three pumping plants on the main canal, four supplemental pumps on the Yellowstone River and one supplemental pump on the Missouri River.

Martha's Place Future Hospice House


Wednesday, Aug. 9, just south of Sidney there was a ribbon cutting for a new non-profit hospice house tasked with providing the dying with a safe and supportive environment for them to move to the other side.

Martha's Place is the dream of Martha Nugent, an Adult-Gerontology Nurse Practitioner, for Allcheck Medical Clinic with a specialty in medical oncology. Seven years ago, she had a vision that she would build a hospice called Martha's Place. She and her husband, Richard Garcia, were living in Texas at the time so she had no inkling that it would have ever been in Sidney, MT. They moved to Sidney in 2020 for her work and things changed. They quickly settled into their new town, new church, and new friends. In 2021, a fellow partitioner from their church by the name of Felix Aguilar approached Martha and her husband. He had just purchased a large house at an auction, and he said he wanted to do something for the elderly with it and thought of them. She started crying and Richard had to step away because he

already knew of her passion for the elderly and the dying. Felix had no prior knowledge of Martha's vision for the hospice house but there he was, there it was, and Martha's Place had begun.

The Martha's Place motto is going to be, "Our Hands, God's Plan". The home is approximately 7,000 sq. ft. with two stories and a full basement on six acres of land. The beautifully land-

scaped property has a barn, pond, and a few other interesting features. The house was custom built with a western theme. Other than the four bedrooms, it has an indoor pool, greenhouse,



and walk-in cooler. Despite its incredible features, the building is not ready to have clients, yet. They have been quoted to need approximately \$2 million of work done by their architect to make the facility a safe and comfortable place for those needing a hospice. Martha, Richard, and Felix also want to modify a few features to serve a new purpose. They want to create a quilting room. There is a fishing shed near the pond they are thinking of turning into a coffee shop for visitors to the hospice and there are plans to add a playground for children who are coming to visit loved ones. Martha would like to encourage people not to be enjoy seeing children on the property. The house is outside city limits so acquiring chickens and stocking the pond are also being considered.

Martha's Place will be available to anyone who chooses not to die in a facility but may not have anyone to care for them at home regardless of social status or ability to pay. So far, the project has been paid for by fundraisers but, with the non-profit paperwork finally accepted by the IRS on June 27. grants are now available to them. Martha's Place will have a fundraiser in October. To keep up on further developments follow Martha's Place - future Hospice House on Facebook.

The special blend of coffee is called Jet Fuel and is unique to Sidney Health Care, as you can't find it anywhere

"Coffee company's try to reach out and have a cause and we have always tried to be supportive of our local communites and to help where it is needed in this area."

Wild Calf Coffee is sold across the area in stores in across Montana and North Dakota, and at all Reynolds larket locations. Wild Calf coffee Nebraska and Washington D.C.

Wild Calf sells several different roasts of coffee, k-cups, and ready-to-drink iced coffee beverages.

They roast several kinds of beans with consistency and high quality. They do this with a 12-kilo roaster made in Germany that can roast up to 22 lbs. at a time. Each roast takes about 14 minutes, and then the beans are dropped into a cooling tray for a few minutes to cool down until they go through a destoner to remove any stones. The beans are then loaded into a net-weigher for bagging and then sealed.

"We have a continuous process to keep the beans fresh," said Harmon.

Wild Calf Coffee Creates Letter To The Editor

During the 2021 Legislature, we set a budget to adequately fund state government operations. It turns out that the State Treasury received a lot more tax revenue that we projected. In almost every area, tax receipts have exceeded our expectations. The cause of that can be debated, but it does not change the fact the state is sitting on an estimated \$1.5 Billion cash surplus. That surplus is in addition to over \$800 million in rainy day funds. This leaves your elected leaders with a very important decision: should the surplus go back to the taxpayers now or should the state government keep it on hand to spend it as the government sees fit?

We are calling for a Special Session of the Legislature in September to give \$900 million in rebates to taxpayers and pay off \$100 million of the State's existing debt. The Democrat's legislative leaders agree that we have a billion-dollar surplus, but, predictably, they have proposed that the Legislature and the Governor use \$750 million for new government spending.

So, you might hear different narrative on how to handle such a large surplus, but no matter how anyone spins it, the question is still the same: do you get your money back or does the government get to keep it to expand government programs? When you hear anyone say "wait until the Legislature meets in January to decide what to do with the surplus", understand that is code for "we want to use the surplus to start new government programs".

In following the spirit of the Governor's Comeback Plan, we favor returning \$900 million in rebates to taxpayers in 2022 before the Legislature meets in 2023 and spends the surplus on more government programs. Even after returning \$900 million to taxpayers, the state will still have \$500 million in surplus funds and another \$800 million in rainy day funds. This is more than enough to meet any contingencies that may arise in the 2023 session.

We believe a very short, one-issue special session would be the best and the fastest way to get your money, earned by you, back to you. This is your state government and your voice is instrumental to our decisions. We encourage you to reach out to your legislators--Republicans and Democrats--and urge that we meet in a Special Session this fall and return \$900 million to the taxpayers.

"I love working with my sisters. My favorite part about raising livestock is that my whole family is involved in it. It has been really cool watching my sisters grow up into it and enjoy it."



Managing Wheat Streak Mosaic Disease By Eliminating The Green Bridge

If you are preparing to plant winter wheat soon, it is important to consider green bridge control to prevent wheat streak mosaic (WSM). Wheat streak mosaic is a viral disease that impacts small grains,

including spring wheat and to 100% yield loss. winter wheat, as well as durum, barley, oats, and corn, among other crops. Symptoms of WSM include yellow streaking and mottling, which usually affects the entire plant. Early infections lead to plant stunting. Wheat streak mosaic impacts can range from insignificant up

This viral disease is transmitted by the wheat curl mite. The wheat curl mite, along with the WSM virus, survive on the green bridge in between crops. The green bridge is the presence of any green plant material between the harvest of one crop and the planting of the

next. Green bridge hosts of WSM virus include volunteer wheat, corn, as well as cheatgrass. Having these hosts in your area increases the risk for WSM, as wheat curl mites can travel several miles in the wind. Because of this, termination of the green bridge is key. Herbicide options include

glyphosate and paraquat. Glyphosate can take up to 2 weeks as it kills slowly, causing the plants to be a host for the wheat curl mites for those 2 weeks following an application. Paraguat is fast acting and reduces the time that wheat curl mites can survive on those plants to 2 to 5 days. Tilling and

swathing are also options to eliminate the green bridge and wheat curl mite populations in just a few days.







Grasshopper Problem Persists For Producers

Farmers across the region have experienced significant losses due to the sky-rocketing grasshopper population.

"The population levels this summer have met the USDA-APHIS projection and, in some areas, have greatly exceeded it. The late snowstorms and cool and wet weather this spring helped combat grasshoppers early on by 1) delaying their hatching, and 2) allowing the grass to grow and get a head start before the grasshoppers had finished hatching," explained MSU Richland County Extension Agent Marley Manoukian.

Grasshoppers thrive in dry weather conditions; outbreaks are usually followed by several years of hot, dry summers and warm falls; these conditions allow grasshopper populations to increase slowly.

"Grasshoppers are responsible for loss of production as well as loss of profit, whether that be through yield loss or through the high input costs of spraying to control the grasshoppers," said Manoukian.

Many producers have struggled with grasshoppers on their pastureland, as the pests compete with grazing livestock for forage. They feed on the desirable forage, leaving the less desirable plants behind. Their feeding, if coupled with drought conditions, is prone to causing long-term deterioration of the forage plants/rangeland. The pests can reduce the quality of rangeland in the same way as cattle overgrazing. Ranchers can help deter grasshopper damage by properly managing their range through proper stocking rates and using insecticides suitable for their operation.

"Grasshoppers may



have caused decreased yield or quality in hay, depending on the population levels in that region. Dryland grass hay production may be of lower quality, as the majority of the damage was to the leaves, which are the most nutrient dense part of the plant. Damage in other hay production varies from minimum damage on the leaves to varying degrees of defoliation," said Manoukian.

Thankfully, many hay cuttings were successfully harvested before the grass-hopper problem escalated. Other parts of North Dakota and Eastern Montana were not as fortunate.

"McKenzie County hay yields are actually very high this year. Pastureland may be affected some, but because of the plethora of crops around McKenzie County, hoppers are going to choose those over competing with livestock," NDSU McKenzie County Extension Agent Devan Leo.

Grasshoppers and locusts can also wipe out crops and keep them from maturing into an actual, tangible crop. The pests migrate and consume almost any plant they come upon. According to www.ndsu.edu, row crop producers should be aware of the potential for grasshoppers to move into row crops after small grains have started to dry down.

The best thing produc-

ers can do is to consider spraying to keep the populations down. Both low and high labeled rates of all insecticides provide control of grasshoppers and prevent economic yield loss.

"Chemical options are available, however, because of the high demand for such products this year, supply was limited," added Manoukian.

Insecticide options include carbaryl such as Sevin, pyrethroids such as Warrior and Mustang Maxx, lambda-cyhalothrin such as Warrior II, and diflubenzuron such Dimilin, among others.


Leo explained, "Many farmers have been applying insecticide since June to control hoppers. They have been very proactive in controlling the problem that could escalate into a disaster. Overall, I am optimistic for our farmers harvesting a yielding crop before the hoppers present any real problems other than an extreme nuisance."

Producers dealing with grasshopper issues, are encouraged to contact local crop-dusting companies to discuss spraying options. Local crop-dusting companies include Sidney Air Service Inc; Mehling Spraying Services, Fairview; Trower Aviation, Scobey; Aero Spraying Service Inc, Williston; and Taylor Ag Services, Inc, Watford City.
