Reuter Receives Janae Moore MVP Award

10, 2013, the Moore family was expecting it to be a normal average day in Sidney, Montana. However, they didn't count that July 10 would have changed their lives forever. David Moore was on his way to Lambert for a job when he spotted what looked like a gray pickup a few hundred yards off the road that had rolled. When arriving at the location of his job he calls

his wife, Terri Moore, asking if anyone in the family had spoken to Janae. Expressing how he saw a truck that looked like theirs rolled over on the way to Lambert. After being unable to reach Janae, Terri and her daughter, Jozie, got into a car and drove by where the accident was. Upon seeing the license plate, Terri knew that the rolled over truck belonged to them. Terri drove into the ditch but was stopped by the Sheriff at

the fence. Word no mother should ever hear was "Terri, she's gone."

After her passing, the Moore family created the "Most Valuable Player" award that recognizes young softball players who exhibit the same traits their daughter did when playing, such as good leadership, sportsmanship, and being a team-player. This year's winner was Kaitlyn Reuter. When nominated by her coach Kale Petrik, who described Kaitlyn as "silent, strong, leader. Positive attitude. Everything you want in a captain and ball player. Took a pitch off the elbow, refused to come out or sit. The next inning she couldn't wing at the bat so I had her bunt, and she turned it into a triple. A stud and my vote for the award." Congratulations to this year's MVP winner Kaitlyn Reuter.

Two males sustain life-threatening injuries after a residential fire on July 7 at approximately 7:37 p.m. (CDT) the McKenzie County Sheriff's Office responded to a residential structure fire north of Arnegard, ND.

The reporting parties indicated the residence was fully engulfed and two individuals had sustained significant burns to their bodies, while three other family members were able to exit the residence without injuries.

Upon arrival of the McKenzie County Sheriff's Office, two males were located and identified as Dustin Ceynar, 48; and Clay Ceynar, 19. Both males were transported to Minneapolis for continued life-saving medical care. 

Seeking Community Input On Expanding **Youth Safety & Wellness** In Richland County

Richland County Health Department is excited to announce they have been selected to receive an inaugural Coordinated School and Community Partnerships Scholarship by School Services of Montana, a nonprofit education organization serving Montana's schools. The scholarship is awarded through the School Service of Montana's Montana Safe and Healthy Schools Project, supported by a "STOP School Violence" grant award from the Bureau of Justice Assistance. The project takes a multi-faceted approach to preventing school violence through professional learning, coordinated school partnerships, and resources and training.

Through this initiative, the Richland County Health Department will become a coordinated school and community "hub", and will be hosting an upcoming series of free events for families in the community, in partnership with Dr. Tim Tharp, Richland County Superintendent of Schools, and the Boys and Girls Club of the MonDak.

The event series "Prioritizing School and Community Wellness" will begin in Fall 2024 with an in-person launch at the Richland Boys and Girls Club, Sidney. Following the fall event, trainings will take place virtually throughout the 2024-25 school year. Sessions will be facilitated by the Cook Center for Human Connection, a national organization which works to support children, families, and schools in eradicating suicide, as well as offering resources and support for those with mental health issues and their caregivers.

The project is seeking input in order to shape the events around topics that are most pressing and relevant in Richland County.

"I am very happy that Richland County was chosen to receive this grant as it will allow us to further explore what services we can provide in rural Montana knowing that mental health resources are extremely limited," added Tharp.

Guiding Principles For Mule Deer Management Plan Released For Public Comment

Fish, Wildlife & Parks is looking for public feedback on work from a citizen advisory council tasked with developing guiding principles for developing a new Mule Deer Management Plan.

"We know how concerned people are with mule deer numbers across the state," said FWP Director Dustin Temple. "Our focus is developing a new plan that will guide our efforts to manage herds well into the future. The council's work is a critical first step for our planning process."

In early 2024, FWP solicited applications from Montana citizens to serve on the Mule Deer Citizen Advisory Council (MDCAC). Composed of 14 members, the MDCAC was selected to develop guiding principles that would inform the development of a new statewide Mule Deer Management Plan

Montana mule deer populations can change from year to year due to a variety of factors that influence survival and recruitment. Population trends from spring surveys across much

HELENA - Montana of Montana were mixed this the MDCAC, FWP will deyear, with some areas showing improved herd growth and some areas with lower recruitment. Concerns about specific factors outlined by the MDCAC include disease (e.g., chronic wasting disease), habitat quality and availability, effects of weather and climate, predation, and hunting pressure.

The MDCAC met three times this spring to develop mule deer management guiding principles. With attention to tradeoffs among them, the guiding principles include but are not limited to:

Increasing mule deer populations

Using best available science to inform management decision

Managing chronic wasting disease

Improving the quality of the hunting experience Improving landowner

relationships

Maximizing opportunity for public input of all stakeholders in plan development, including hunters, landowners and nonhunting wildlife enthusiasts

Informed by the guiding principles proposed by velop a mule deer statewide management plan that provides management flexibility. Currently, FWP is seeking further public comment on the guiding principles recommended by the MDCAC. The Problem Statement and Guiding Principles can be viewed at fwp. mt.gov/aboutfwp/commission-councils-committees/ mule-deer-citizens-advisory-committee.

The public comment period is open for 30 days beginning July 16. Public comment can be submitted through Aug. 15. The planning process will continue with the additional insights offered by the public in their review of the MD-CAC's guiding principles. 





North Dakota Bait Regulations

OUTDOORS

Live white suckers are not legal baitfish in North Dakota, except in the Bois de Sioux and Red rivers.

Anglers can use live white suckers on the Bois de Sioux and Red rivers, and tributaries up to the first vehicular bridge; however, they are illegal elsewhere. Fathead minnows, sticklebacks and creek chubs are the only legal live baitfish outside of the Bois de Sioux and Red rivers.

The transportation of live white suckers, other than in Richland, Cass, Traill, Grand Forks, Walsh and Pembina counties, is illegal.

In addition, it is illegal for anglers to import minnows and other forms of live aquatic bait, such as leeches and frogs, into North Dakota.

When purchasing live aquatic bait, anglers must buy from a licensed North Dakota retail bait vendor. Bait vendors can properly identify species and ensure all bait is clean of any aquatic nuisance species.

For more information, refer to the 2024-26 North Dakota Fishing Guide, available at license vendors or online at the state Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov.

Boat North Dakota Course

North Dakota state law requires youth ages 12-15 who want to operate a boat or personal watercraft by themselves with at least a 10-horsepower motor must pass the state's boating basics course.

The course is available for home-study by contacting the North Dakota Game and Fish Department at 701-328-6300, or ndgf@nd.gov. Two commercial providers also offer the course online, and links to those sites are on the boat and water safety education page on the Game and Fish website at gf.nd.gov.

While the home-study course is free, there is a fee to take it online. The online provider charges for the course, not the Game and Fish Department. The fee remains with the online provider.

The course covers legal requirements, navigation rules, getting underway, accidents and special topics such as weather, rules of the road, laws, life saving and first aid.

Boy Scout Troop 141's Fair Booth

Boy Scout Troop 141's contribution to the Richland County Fair began with a modest portable structure, measuring just 8x6 feet with a 6-ft. ceiling. The troop would set up the booth for the fair's four days and then would haul it away until the following year. Despite its humble beginnings, the menu was initially tiny, limited to candy, pop, and popcorn due to the building's size. However, in 1993, everything changed thanks to the generosity of former member Cliff Larson, who provided the necessary seed money to pour concrete and enable the troop to build a permanent structure where it now stands, greatly expanding the possibilities for what they could offer at the fair. One of the features that makes the booth unique compared to other booths is its double-sided serving window. There is a serving window not only on the grandstand side but also on the midway side, providing easy access for both grandstand and midway traffic. With the unwavering support of several dedicated parents,

including Ron Gebhardt, Jay Pfau, Russ Markwald, Stan Rosaaen, Brad Carroll, and Larry Garman, as well as the dedicated Boy Scouts, led by Shawn Markwald, Chris Barone, Craig Gebhardt, Nick Gebhardt, Erik Carroll, Jeremy Pfau and Travis Rosaaen, a permanent structure took shape. This team effort transformed the modest booth into the substantial building that it is today, showcasing the community's spirit and commitment to excellence.

Over the years since 1993, the structure has seen a few changes and additions that have shaped it into the impressive building it is today. In 1998, cotton candy was added to the menu, providing attendees with a delightful treat. In the early 2000s, Sidney Sugars began generously donating locally grown sugar to the troop, allowing them to proudly say that all cotton candy was sourced from local sugar. The Boy Scouts are grateful for Sidney Sugars' consistent donations over the years and extend a heartfelt thanks for their support. For Boy Scout Troop 141,

the fair booth is of utmost importance as it is the sole source of income for the entire year. The revenue earned through the booth eliminates the need for the troop to solicit donations from local businesses or engage in any other fundraising efforts throughout the year. The current menu offers a variety of delectable items, including all-beef hot dogs, nachos, pop, lemonade and tea, popcorn, and the ever-popular cotton candy. The dedicated members of Boy Scout Troop 141 spin approximately 1,200 lbs. of sugar each fair and sell an astonishing 4,000 bags of cotton candy over the course of the four-day Richland County Fair! New Richland County Fair Building Doubles Event Space

In the style of the new cattle barn and the 4-H and school exhibit buildings, the new addition to the Event Center has the look of a barn on the outside. "It has the feel of the ag style, not industrial. It feels like a county fair," Richland County Fair Manager Pam Shelmidine explained. With B&B Builders as general contractor, and using local sub-contractors where ever possible, the addition was built using county oil and gas money, with no additional taxpayer funding.

Exhibitors at this year's fair will relish the air conditioning, as they show off their

flowers, culinary skills, needlework, photography and fine arts as well as those famous community booths and seed pictures! New displays are being built for exhibits and old ones repainted to make them look a lot more at home. "Everything's getting a face lift," Shelmidine said. She added that they hope to have some tables and chairs available to give visitors a break as well.

The 20,000 sq. ft. building has the same capacity as the event center in a more-square configuration. It features a huge open area which cannot be divided, with overhead doors at each end you could drive

a combine through. Entry doors on the north and south side feature a vestibule with air locks to prevent heat or cooling to escape. Be sure to look up when you walk in the lighting is stunning! The cove lighting around the perimeter even changes color.

Three meeting rooms along the east side can be used for a multitude of events. One of those rooms is equipped for audio-visual presentations, making it a great choice for meetings. The other two are multi-purpose and could be used for birthday parties, showers, or as a staging area for caterers. "They have endless possibilities," Shelmidine

said. There is also ample storage for tables, chairs and exhibit displays.

The spacious bathrooms, which are ADA compliant, feature troughs with two faucets and a hand dryer in each. Changing tables are included in both the men's and women's bathrooms.

Twenty-two-foot overhangs on each end of the building provide a lot of exterior space for vendors or a place to just get out of the weather. Dumpster enclosures have also been built to accommodate both buildings and keep trash from public view.

The building does not have a kitchen, but the one in the Event Center can be rented along with the east room for extra space. That would also give access to all the bathrooms, tables and chairs. The entire complex could be opened up to allow big fundraisers to accommodate more people. Shelmidine said both spaces are already booked for two conventions and hopes it will attract more. "It helps the restaurants, hotels, gas stations. It benefits the whole community. We all work together," she stated. Shelmidine is also excit-


ed about the new extra-wide sidewalk which will run from the parking lot directly to the grandstand. Unfortunately,

the sidewalk will not have lights for this year's fair but those will be installed as soon as possible. "The sidewalk will provide for better handicap access to all events, including the fair," Shelmidine said. "Everyone should feel included when it comes to the fair,"

The white gate which guarded the entrance to the fairgrounds for decades will find a new home at the end of the sidewalk on the west side of the Event Center.

Stop by and visit during the Richland County Fair & Rodeo. Doors open at 11 a.m. Gates open at 9 a.m.

"Tough Enough To Wear Pink" Celebrates 17th Year At The Richland County Fair & Rodeo





The idea was to challenge the tough rodeo contestants

to wear pink at one of the NFR performances in support of families facing breast cancer. The event was an instant hit with cowboys and fans wearing pink. The 2024 National Finals Rodeo (NFR) in December marks the 20th anniversary of the campaign. "Tough Enough To Wear Pink" has raised over \$41 million! All funds raised have stayed in the local communities," said Lacey Wheatley, TETWP

Campaign Manager.

In 2007, the Richland County Fair & Rodeo brought the TETWP campaign to its rodeo. That first year, the fair and Pearl Development raised just over \$1,400, which was donated to the Montana Breast & **Cervical Cancer Awareness** Program. In between running a tractor, feed truck, or managing livestock while working on his parent's farm and ranch operation, Corbin Steinbeisser manages to raise a quality 4-H steer, and helps his younger siblings with theirs, as much as they allow him to, that is. In his first year of showing, he won Reserve in Novice Showmanship with his market steer, so he certainly knows how to get one in the winner's circle. Maintaining a reliable feed schedule and lots of time are his keys to a good animal to present at the Richland County Fair.

The son of Jim and MayAnn Steinbeisser, Sidney. Corbin also enjoys shooting sports and woodworking projects.

He earned Best of Fair with a potato battery several years ago, and last year won Judges Choice for his display of different shotgun ammunitions and their uses. Two years ago, Corbin attended 4-H Congress after winning his division at Richland County 4-H Speech and Demonstration Day, and greatly enjoyed the experience. He and other 4-H members were able to observe a cannulated cow; which is a cow that has a surgically installed port-hole device through which their stomach can be studied. The dance was also a highlight of his Congress trip.

Corbin in the past has competed on the Richland County 4-H Livestock Judging Team, and in his time on it they won the Keith Steinbeisser Memorial Livestock Judaina.

Montana State University, Bozeman, is Corbin's destination this coming fall, with a degree in farm and ranch management in mind. He hopes his years in 4-H have him well-prepared for the courses and knows the value of Parliamentary Procedure in future leadership roles. He would like to eventually join the Montana Stockgrowers Association and plans to continue his ((family's ranch and farm operation.










It's A Family Tradition – Brookman Rodeo, LLC

Like Hank Williams, Jr.'s song "Family Tradition," rodeo runs deep in the Wieferich family, Sidney. Dave and Cathy Wieferich officially took over the family business in 2002 when Marvin Brookman, Cathy's grandfather and founder of Brookman Rodeo Company, suffered a stroke. They continue Marvin Brookman's legacy since his death in 2006 and have been producing the Richland County Fair & Rodeo since 2009.

Marvin started Brookman Rodeo in 1936 at the age of 23 when he joined the Cowboys Turtle Association, a precursor to the PRCA rodeo association. He began with 150 buckers culled from his father's herd of 500 horses, focusing on bucking stock and establishing the "Born to Buck" breeding program.

Rodeo is ingrained in the Brookman family. Marvin's daughter, Reita, and her husband Jim Reinhart were integral to the ranch and rodeo operations. Reita timed rodeos and was active until her passing in May 2007, while Jim continued to reside at Buzzards Glory Ranch near Wolf Point and supported Brookman Rodeo until his health declined. Jim passed away in July 2019.

The family legacy continues with Dave and Cathy at the helm, supported by their children, LaTasha (Trey) Sheets, Tesa Wieferich, and Tate Wieferich. Raised in the business, their children have grown up caring for animals and working in the arena during the shows. Tate, under Dave's and Kenny Barringer's guidance, learned the art of flanking horses and made his NFR debut in 2022. Kenny Barringer, considered family, as the bull partner for the company he is an indispensable part of the rodeo organization. They cherish the camaraderie of traveling across the U.S. to 25+ rodeos including Pendleton, OR, and the NFR, meeting old friends and making new ones - a testament to rodeo's tight-knit community.

Brookman Rodeo returns for its 15th year producing the Richland County Fair's PRCA Rodeo on Aug. 1 & 2. Over the years, they have enhanced the entertainment value and stock quality, incorporating superior sound and video replay to captivate the sellout Sidney audience. Some renowned horses like Kid Rock, Smiling Bob, Joe Dirt, Risky Business, Rude Roommate, Lunatic Bait, Flirtatious and Famous Dex have showcased their skills at both the NFR in Vegas and the local Richland County Fair.

Dave and Cathy uphold Marvin's "Born to Buck" breeding program, considering Brookman horses as part of their extended family. From their birth on the ranch, the Wieferichs have witnessed their horses' journeys from unknowns to stars in the arena. A couple of favorite horses went on to greener pastures, including Kid Rock and Famous Dex. Kid Rock's last rodeo was at the Sidney fair which Tanner Butler won, Kid Rock then retired to the ranch in 2023 and passed away this January at 27, epitomizing his journey. Similarly, Famous Dex, a rising star at 9, tragically passed away on the Sidney Ranch after an injury at the 2022 Pendleton Round-Up, leaving a hole in the hearts of everyone who loved him. He was named the 3rd top PRCA bareback horse that same year. While these losses hurt, the Wieferich family is excited about their horses and the new and old stars of the arena.

The PRCA rodeo has been a cornerstone of the Richland County Fair since 1960, celebrating its 64th year in 2024. The rodeo spans two nights - Thursday, is Hero's Night, and Friday, dedicated to Tough Enough to Wear Pink. Both nights start at 7 p.m.




