City Of Sidney Requesting Homeowners Return EPA Required Water Pipe Surveys

The EPA requires documentation of water pipes from all entities, whether municipal or private, to determine if there are lead pipes being used for the water supply to homes. After the disaster in Flint, MI, and other areas of the country, the EPA is taking needed steps to eradicate all lead pipes and prevent that type of contamination in all parts of the country.

The City of Sidney mailed surveys to 2550 homeowners in the city in March. Not all residents received a letter since newer homes do not use lead pipes. At this time, over 600 property owners have not returned the required survey.

If a home is found to have lead pipes, the city has federal grant money to replace those pipes, at no cost to the property owner. Replacement of pipes in four

homes has already been completed. "It's a good thing for the property owner," Jessica Chamberlin, city clerk and treasurer, said. "The city manages the project and makes sure it's done right, all at no cost."

Those property owners who have not returned the mailed survey may complete it and mail it to City Hall, or request a new form if they have misplaced the first one. They can also text pictures

of their water meters that are located inside the building where the water supply comes in, with their address, to 406-478-0664. Pictures must have the entire meter and the pipe coming into and out of the residence.

If a property owner does not know where to locate the meter, they can call City Hall at 406-433-1117 to have one of their operators come and look at it. Residents may also email sidneywaterde-

partment@gmail.com to provide the pictures or the survey.

Since this survey is required by the EPA, the City will have to do door to door calls to complete the project if all surveys are not returned by mid-October. Making sure that pipes are not lead helps to ensure the safety of residents and improves any potential resale value in the future so please return the survey as soon as possible.



McKenzie Co. Three Vehicle Injury Crash Occurs West Of New Town June 6

A three vehicle multi-injury crash occurred June 6 at approximately 2:39 p.m. CT on Hwy. 23 at approximately 14 miles west of New Town.

A 1969 Ford Mustang with its left turn signal activated was stopped near the fog line facing west waiting to make a left turn off Hwy. 23 onto a gravel road. The Ford Mustang was waiting for a 2022 Ford F-150 traveling east on Hwy. 23 before turning left onto the gravel road. A 2005 Nissan Murano was also traveling west on Hwy. 23 behind the Ford Mustang. The Nissan Murano struck the rear of the Ford Mustang. The Ford Mustang came to rest in the north ditch of Hwy. 23. The Nissan Murano entered the east lane of Hwy. 23 and struck the 2022 Ford F-150. The Nissan Murano came to rest in the middle of Hwy. 23. The Ford F-150 came to rest on the shoulder of the road.

Ronald Klimpel, 45, driver of the Ford Mustang, sustained serious injuries and was flown to Sanford Hospital, Bismarck. He was accompanied by Linda Klimpel, 42, who sustained minor injuries and was released on scene.

Richard Booker, 76, Michigan, ND, driver of the Nissan Murano, also sustained serious injuries and was transported to McKenzie County Health, Watford City, but was later transferred to Sanford Hospital, Fargo. Ausha Scales, 42, Michigan, ND, passenger in the Nissan Murano, sustained serious injuries and was flown to Sanford Hospital, Fargo. The 8-year-old male juvenile passenger in the Nissan Murano sustained serious injuries and was flown to Trinity Hospital, Minot, but was later transferred to Sanford Hospital, Fargo.

Phillip Tyra, driver of the Ford F-150, sustained minor injuries and was released on scene.

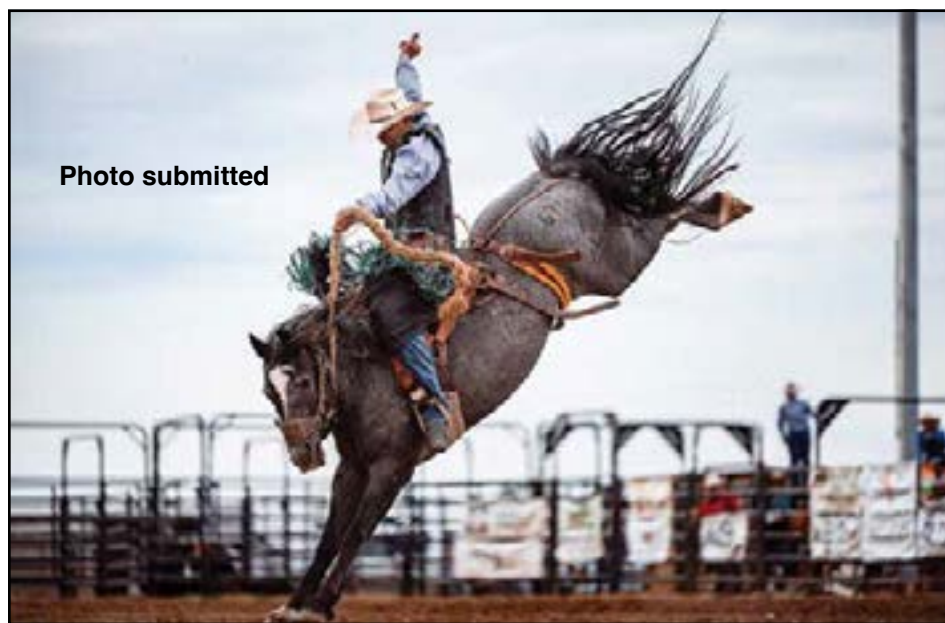
Thursday night is Extreme Sports night with Knights and Bikes featuring BMX riders performing aerobatics while jumping up to 75 feet in the air, and Knights of

Ridl is a local Sidney woman with a heart for many hobbies. Her professional job as the City of Sidney Parks Superintendent allows her to utilize her degree in horticulture. She actually creates some of her pieces

with salvaged wood from her day job.

"My latest passion lies in welded art as well as creating one-of-a-kind pieces from salvaged wood using my chainsaw, grinder and sanders. I gravitate towards landscape scenes with mountain ranges from around Montana and surrounding areas," Ridl said of her recent projects. She was also recently commissioned to create two custom, "Sidney-inspired" pieces for the remodeled City Hall. Currently, one is on display in the Council Chambers and is regularly admired for its depth and creative use of mixed media forms.

Ridl formally began her artistic business, "Urban Legends", in 2023. "Urban Legends" was founded as

a creative outlet to blend old and rustic materials in with new to create one of a kind artwork. The live edge pieces are reclaimed wood sourced from high-risk trees that were removed to eliminate potential hazard or trees that failed due to windthrow.

Metal components have been recycled from a variety of automotive shops and sanitation discoveries. Each piece of artwork has been handcrafted to bring life and beauty back to discarded materials. There's nothing as exciting as a comeback.

As teenagers, Irene and her sisters would frequent the Dreamland dance hall where she met her soon-to-be husband Gottlieb Schmierer. They married on August 5, 1946, in Glendive, MT. She rejoiced in this day as she went from working the sugar beet fields by hand to a farmer with actual beet digging equipment. Their starter home was in the Midway Community. In 1950, they moved to the farm at Savage and started their family. Gottlieb and Irene were blessed with three children: Dennis, Dee Ann, and Lee Roy. They also raised Irene's brother Delton who they considered more of a son than a brother. Irene and Delton were closer than any siblings could be. Williston City Commission Approves STAR Fund Grants For New Malting Plant, Healthcare Equipment, and Oilfield Projects

Williston, ND – The Williston City Commission has approved a STAR Fund grant for a new value-added agriculture project in Williams County. ND Malting and Hops, Inc. began production on Thursday, May 23, 2024. The new plant is locally owned by two farmers.

“ND Malting and Hops is an exciting new facility located north of Williston near XWA Airport. This facility has been in the works for some time and is locally owned by David Anfinson and Paul Weyrauch. The grains processed in the facility are grown by the owners and will be used for the 2 row malting process and then shipped to help meet the demand for micro brewing facilities providing malt from some of the best varieties available,” explained Small Business Development Center Regional Director Keith Olson.

ND Malting and Hops, located at 5715 139th Ave. NW, offers customer malting, cleaning, and bagging or bulk loads of grains. The plant can malt up to 30 tons per week.

The Williston STAR

Fund and Williams County will each contribute up to \$135,000 to the project via the Flex PACE program. Williams County will provide matching dollars because the project falls outside of Williston’s extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ). The Bank of North Dakota will also provide a 2-to-1 match to those dollars. The Flex PACE program combines local resources with BND’s PACE Fund to buy down the interest on commercial loans.

“With the help of STAR Fund dollars, we were able to build a quality facility that is competitive both locally, regionally, and internationally while keeping dollars in our community and promote Northwest North Dakota agriculture,” said owner David Anfinson.

The Williston City Commission also approved STAR Fund grants for Busy Bees Enterprises, KO Safety Services, and McKenzie County Healthcare Systems at its meeting on Tuesday, May 28.

Flex PACE Applications
Busy Bees Enterprises: The company will receive up to \$32,500 from the

STAR Fund and a matching \$32,500 from Williams County because the project is located outside of Williston’s extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ). Busy Bees is purchasing the assets of an existing business to keep the company local and maintain jobs. The business is located at 5057 141st Ave. NW.

KO Safety Services: The company will receive up to \$63,000 from the Flex PACE program to purchase the building they are currently renting at 5807 W. Front St

Community Grant Applications
McKenzie County Healthcare Systems: The Williston Clinic will receive up to \$100,000 (\$50,000 in 2024 and \$50,000 in 2025) to purchase new echocardiogram equipment. The equipment will enhance cardiac health and services in the Williston area.

The STAR Fund is supported by a voter-approved one cent city sales tax, with seventy-five percent allocated to offset city infrastructure costs and the remaining 25% dedicated to job creation, business development, and retention efforts.

The STAR Fund portion of the tax is governed by a seven-member advisory board which meets monthly. Deadline To Purchase SuperTag Chances is June 30

HELENA – Hunters have until June 30 to purchase a chance for a SuperTag for the 2024 hunting season. Eight hunters will win a SuperTag license for one of the following species: moose, bighorn sheep, mountain goat, antelope,

elk, deer, bison and mountain lion. One SuperTag will be drawn for each species. The SuperTag can be used in any hunting district in Montana – including Montana's trophy districts.

To see the number of SuperTag chances sold,

hunters can check the FWP website each Monday between now and June 30. Revenue from SuperTag sales is used to enhance hunting access and boost Fish, Wildlife & Parks enforcement efforts. A Conservation License is required

to purchase a SuperTag; each SuperTag chance is \$5. There is no limit on the number of chances a hunter can buy.

In 2023, the Montana Legislature established a new SuperTag for residents. In addition to purchasing regular SuperTag chances, every Montana resident who purchases a general elk or deer license on or before June 30 will automatically receive one entry into the new resident SuperTag drawing. This year, the Montana Fish and Wildlife Commission determined the

resident SuperTag will be for a moose license. Like other SuperTags, the winner will be able to hunt for moose in any moose hunting district in Montana.

To purchase chances online, go to FWP's Online Licensing Service. You'll receive a receipt verifying purchase that lists your lottery numbers. SuperTag chances are also available for purchase at FWP offices and license providers.

Those who win a SuperTag and also draw a license or permit through FWP's special permit license

drawings will be required to surrender that license or permit before receiving the SuperTag. FWP will refund the license fee associated with the special permit or license and reinstate any bonus points. Montana's seven-year wait for individuals who draw a moose, sheep or goat license through Montana's special permit license drawings will not be imposed on SuperTag winners.

The drawing for SuperTags will be held in early July. To check your drawing status, go to MyFWP.

Don't Rush Wrong Farm Bill: Take Time To Forge Bill That Strengthens Family Farms & Ranches

Recently, I joined other National Farmers Union leaders in meetings with the House Ag and Senate Ag committees about each of their versions of the 2024 Farm Bill. Based on those discussions, a tight timeline, and the need for modifications to both versions, I'm not optimistic for the passage of a 2024 Farm Bill but foresee another extension.

The Senate version and the House version of the Farm Bill are strikingly different — and, in the current Congress, "compromise" is a dirty word. Nonetheless, Congress will not allow the Farm Bill to expire, because then we would revert to permanent law of the 1949

Farm Act. Price supports included in the 1949 Farm Act would result in taxpayers paying producers higher prices for commodities than the current marketplace. This backstop has forced Congress to act in the past, and I think it will again.

Even though the House version was passed out of committee, most agree it will struggle to pass the full House, with some representatives arguing it was passed only to be used as a political football in the 2024 campaign. The House version favors large corporate farms. It also redirects funding in the Inflation Reduction Act, from voluntary conservation programs, to instead fund programs that benefit the largest farms at the expense of family farms.

Meanwhile, the Senate version leaves in place Inflation Reduction Act funding that fully funds voluntary conservation programs, like CSP, EQIP, ACEP, and RCPP. Historically, these programs were woefully underfunded at levels with only enough funding to cover the cost of 1 of every 4 applications.

The Senate version establishes a Special Investigator with the powers of the DOJ to enforce the rules of the Packers and Stockyards Act and address the anticompetitive practices of corporate monopolies. Including this in the farm bill would make Senator Tester's proposed Special Investigator bill as well as the USDA's "Chief Competition Officer" created by the Biden

administration permanent.

The Senate version solidifies in law a USDA Cattle Contract Library, which is a good first step in restoring price transparency to the livestock market. Shedding daylight on the secret contracts between corporate feeders and corporate packers is essential for a competitive marketplace, but it still requires cash trade before slaughter to determine the basis in the contracts.

The Senate version further establishes standards for voluntary U.S. origin labeling claims for Food Safety Inspection Service products. Including this in the Farm Bill protects the current rules in future administrations by codifying President Biden's rule that Product of USA can only

be used on products born, raised, and processed in the USA.

Unfortunately, the Senate version also includes the A Plus Act. This will weaken the Packers and Stockyards Act by allowing auction yard owners to own a packing plant of up to 2,000 head per day of cattle and/or 10,000 head of hogs per day. This is prohibited by the PSA — and should continue to be prohibited. Allowing auction yards to operate large packing plants will aid in the consolidation of livestock auction yards into the hands of few and reduce competition at the expense of the smaller regional yards. Instead, full enforcement of the PSA and requiring cash trade just before slaughter would expand our current

livestock auction yards.

There are roughly 30 days between now and the general election when both the House and Senate are in session. That's not enough time for proper debate, compromise, and the passage of a Farm Bill that strengthens family farms and ranches. Some are advocating to pass a Farm Bill now, but Farmers Union is advocating to pass the right Farm Bill.

Farmers Union believes the best way to predict the future is to create it. That is why we are working to help forge a Farm Bill that will create a strong future for family farmers and ranchers.

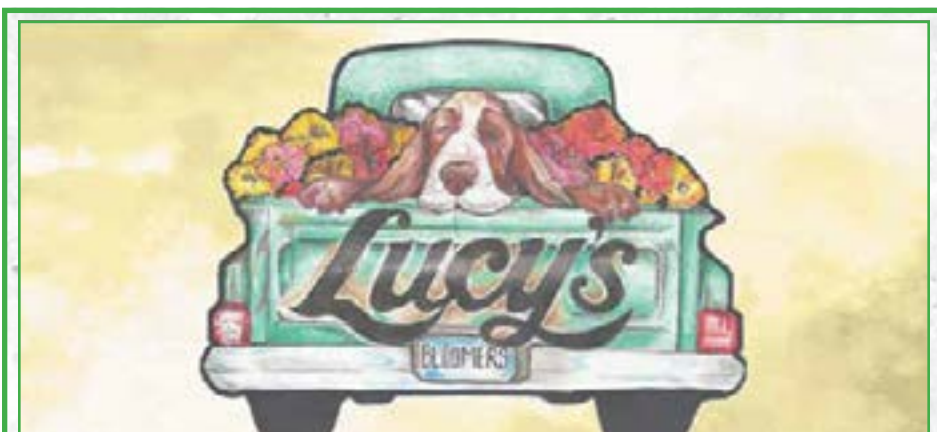

Stay Safe This Summer

So far it has felt like a long spring with mild temperatures here in eastern Montana but if you've lived here for any length of time, you know the heat is just around the corner. While there is plenty to enjoy about summer it also comes with certain dangers, especially for senior citizens. 1. Hydrate, and then hydrate some more! Once you start to feel thirsty, you've already started becoming dehydrated. As we age, our bodies start to lose the ability to conserve fluid which makes it even more important to continue drinking before you start feeling parched.

2. Protect your skin. Aging affects its elasticity and the amount of moisture it retains so it can be more sensitive to the sun.



It can also take longer to repair sun damage so make sure you wear sunscreen with at least a 30 SPF.

3. Avoid extreme tem-

peratures. High heat and humidity is risky business for seniors. Avoid unsafe temps by going outside early in the morning or later in the evening to avoid the worst of the heat.

4. Know the signs of heat exhaustion and heat stroke so you can take immediate action—find a cool place to sit, hydrate and apply a cold compress to the skin. Symptoms include:

- Red of flushed skin
- Rapid heartbeat
- Tiredness
- Headache
- Confusion
- Weakness
- Dizziness
- Nausea

5. Be the cool kid in the neighborhood! Run your A/C to keep your home cool or, at the very least, comfortable. When the weather reaches 90 degrees or more, try not

to worry about your electricity bill and let the air conditioning run. High room temperatures can significantly affect a senior's ability to sleep and communicate which opens the door to even more issues.

Following these simple precautions will help you enjoy the warm weather while protecting your body. You can even make summer safety a group effort! Check in on your friends, neighbors and family and ask them to do the same. Working together will make it easier to safeguard your health while taking advantage of all the things summer is known for. 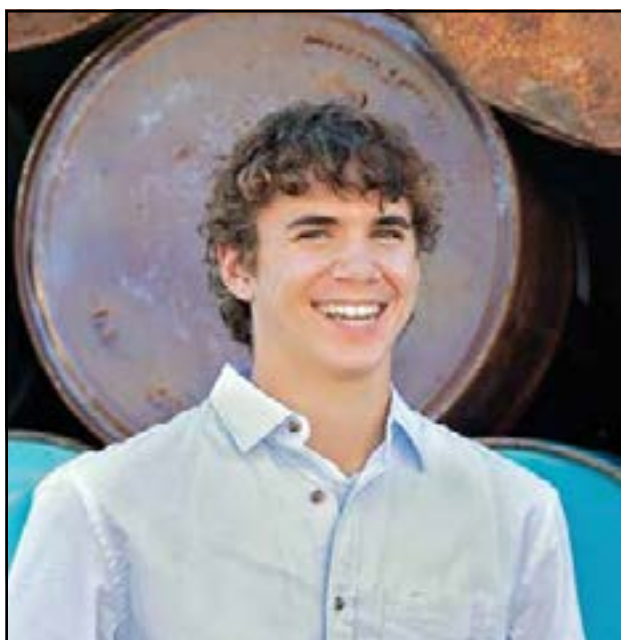

Sidney Health Center Certifies Almost 400 Employees In QPR Training To Combat Suicide

Sidney, MT – Sidney Health Center is proud to announce that 393 of its employees have successfully completed Question, Persuade, and Refer (QPR) training, equipping them with essential skills to address and prevent suicide within the community. This significant achievement underscores the organization's commitment to enhancing mental health support in Richland County, particularly given Montana's high suicide rates.

Richard Evans and Tim Tharp were instrumental in establishing the training program at Sidney Health Center. Both individuals have completed the QPR Gatekeeper Instructor Certification Program, which includes key objectives such as:

- Training participants to teach QPR Gatekeeper Training for Suicide Prevention
- Understanding the nature and range of suicidal communications
- Knowing the groups at greatest risk of suicide and why QPR can work for them
- The history of suicide and suicide prevention

- Gatekeeper training: how, why, and the research behind it

- New and promising approaches to suicide prevention

- How QPR fits into national efforts

"QPR is an anti-suicide initiative designed to give members of the public the skills necessary to intervene on behalf of an individual who is suicidal," explains Richard Evans, a certified QPR trainer and chaplain at Sidney Health Center. "The goal is to train staff to recognize factors that may lead to suicidal ideation or behavior and help those individuals make a life-affirming choice by connecting them with local resources."

As one of the largest employers in Richland County, Sidney Health Center is committed to training all its employees to address mental health and wellness in the community. During April and May, approximately 70% of the workforce attended these trainings and became QPR-certified. Moving forward, Sidney Health Center will offer this certification course to new employees on a quarterly basis.

crisis and how to intervene effectively by questioning, persuading, and referring someone to appropriate help. The benefits to the community include:

- Increased Awareness: The training raises awareness about suicide and its warning signs, leading to a more vigilant and supportive community.

- Reduced Stigma: Open discussions about mental health and suicide help reduce stigma, encouraging more people to seek help.

- Stronger Support Networks: Trained individuals can offer vital support to friends, family, and colleagues, enhancing the community's overall support system.

- Empowered Community Members: People feel empowered to make a positive difference, fostering

a sense of responsibility and collective action.

- Enhanced Behavioral Health Services: QPR certification complements other mental health initiatives, creating a comprehensive approach to care.
