Busse, Graybill Hold Town Hall In **Sidney**

Ryan Busse, Democrat candidate for governor of Montana, fulfilled a lifelong dream when he moved from his farm/ranch community in Kansas to Kalispell 30 years ago and had a career as the vice president of sales for Kimber, one of the largest gun manufacturers in the United States. "This place made me a better person," he said. His running mate Raph Graybill is a 5th generation Montanan who has a long history in Montana politics and whose grandfather, Leo, chaired the 1972 Constitutional Convention.

Busse and Gravbill wish to restore the basic fabric of the state by returning to the 1972 Montana Constitution which Busse says Governor Gianforte has repeatedly ignored. They want a Montana where regular people can expect to pay reasonable property taxes, find affordable housing, a great public education for their children and keep government out of doctors' offices.

Property tax relief is high on Busse's priority list. He says that the governor misused the recent \$2.6 billion dollar surplus by giving tax breaks to big corporations while everyday homeowners saw property tax increases, making housing in some areas more expensive than even California. "People can't afford to live where they work," Busse stated. "I know of teachers who have to drive 100 miles just to get to work. Gianforte is tone deaf to it." He said he was recently in Havre where the city is struggling to hire police officers, partly because of the high cost of housing. The property tax increases hit renters particularly hard since rental properties did not qualify for any of the rebates and property owners usually had to raise rents. Farms and ranches that are incorporated also suffered since they did not qualify either. "We are in peril because of the decisions the governor is making," Busse

NDDOT & McKenzie County Celebrate Completion Of US 85 Project Near Watford City

BISMARCK, ND - The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) and McKenzie County celebrated the completion of the U.S. Highway 85 four-lane project, from Watford City to the Long X Bridge, and adjacent shared-use path Friday, Oct. 25.

Chad Orn, NDDOT deputy director for planning, State Senator Brad Bekkedahl, and other state and local officials were in attendance to participate in a ribbon cutting ceremony.

"The successful completion of this Highway 85 four-lane project is a major win for the state of North Dakota," said Orn. "This heavily traveled highway received several major upgrades that will increase safety for motorists and pedestrians, improve traffic flow and enhance the movement of

goods." The \$100 million paving project included expanding the highway to four-lanes from Watford City south to the Long X Bridge, new adjacent shared-use path, landslide repair, added wildlife

accommodations and more.

"This is truly a great day for McKenzie County and our region," said Howdy Lawlar, McKenzie County Board of County Commissioners chairman. "Thank you to NDDOT, the contractor CSI, the designers, engineers, and everyone else for their diligence in completing this project. We also thank

the citizens for their patience during construction."

How Measure 4 Affects Schools

Every two years, November is a flurry of action with Election Day. This year, there are several new measures proposed in North Dakota as amendments to the state constitution. While each of these measures has its own set of benefits and challenges, measure #4 stands out as the one that will affect schools the most.

Measure #4 directly states: "This initiated measure would amend sections 1. 14. 15. and 16 and repeal sections 4, 5, 7, 9 and 10 of Article X of the North Dakota Constitution. It would prohibit political subdivisions from beyond the two and one-half percent limit and a school district, by a majority vote, could increase the indebtedness of the school district two and one-half percent beyond the two and onehalf percent limit. It would allow an incorporated city. without regard to the existing indebtedness of the city, to become indebted in an amount not exceeding two percent of its full and true value for water and sewer projects. It would require a political subdivision incurring indebtedness to provide for annual revenues to pay the debt payments when due and would prohibit a political subdivision from issuing general obligation bonds secured with levying any tax on real or personal property except for the payment of bonded indebtedness incurred before the end of the

30-day period following the date this amendment was approved by the voters, until such debt is paid, and would require the state to provide replacement payments to political subdivisions of no less than the amount of tax levied on real property during the 2024 calendar year. It would limit the debt of a political subdivision to an amount not to exceed two and one-half percent of the full and true value of the real property in the political subdivision, except that an incorporated city, by a twothirds vote, could increase the indebtedness of the city one and one-half percent tax levied on the assessed value of property on or after January 1, 2025." (Ballotopedia, 2024).

So, what does this measure mean? Essentially, it removes property tax based on assessed value. Property tax provides the state \$3.15 billion biannually, about onesixth of the state's budget. Over 30% of the revenue provided by property tax comes from large out-ofstate businesses, such as Oneok, which pays around \$19 million biannually- \$8 million in McKenzie County

"What Measure Four does is put in the State Constitution that state subdivisions cannot use assessed value for property tax and assigns the responsibility of the state of North Dakota to pay political subdivisions the equivalent of whatever the 2024 political tax is," said Senator Dale Patten on

Most homeowners pay around \$2,000 a year in property tax. Yet, only 15% of property tax revenues come from individual home-

"Of the top 25 property taxpayers in McKenzie County, only one has a McKenzie County address. Only three have an address in North Dakota." Senator Patten explains. "The people in support of the measure say that the state needs to cut back on spending, but the state has a very strict budget. Cutting back on spending would mean cutting back on services."

Biannually, the state has around \$19.6 billion. \$6 billion is provided by the federal government for specific purposes determined by the national government. \$7 billion is special use funds, which also have specific purposes, including college tuition, hunting licenses, and roads. That leaves \$6 billion in the general funds, which are funds generated by taxes. If the measure passes, that money is cut in half.

"We don't have \$3.2 billion lying around," says Representative Richter. "Nobody likes property tax, but local property tax pays for local services."




from public education to fund private schools is totally wrong according to Busse. "Public schools are the heart of small towns. He took money away from those kids to give to rich kids in private schools. I am not down with that! And it's in the constitution that we can't do that," he firmly stated.

Busse believes we need to look for ways to make life better for every family. He wants to restore the Child Tax Credit which was passed by a bi-partisan legislature and he says Gianforte ignored. He also wants to restore the Department of Labor and use it as it should be, to develop a good labor force in the state. As a life-long hunter and nature lover, Busse is upset with what he sees as Gianforte's dismantling of Fish, Wildlife and Parks. He said the governor's actions are providing greater access for wealthy out of state hunters and increasing pressure on wildlife.

As governor, Busse would work to protect the rights of women and families as defined by the Montana constitution. He believes that the government does not belong in doctors' offices telling women what they can and can't do with their own body. He said he has seen instances where women and their families are forced to make horrific decisions about their pregnancies and believes they should have the right to do so without government interference.

"Gianforte refuses to use his office to improve the lives of working folks. We are laser focused on working folks and everyday Montanans, and getting back to the constitution," Busse said bluntly.

Please be advised that the county's ExpressVote voting system and DS450 Central Scanner & Tabulator are on public exhibition at the Richland County Clerk & Recorder's Office at 201 W Main through November 5, 2024. The ExpressVote voting system may be demonstrated at any time between 8am and 5pm, Monday through Friday, upon request. The DS450 will be publicly tested at 2pm on Thursday, October 31, 2024 for the November 5, 2024 Election.



The ExpressVote is a ballot-marking system that is available for anyone to use during the upcoming election. Its main purpose is to allow voters with disabilities and other special needs to mark a ballot privately and independently.

13-35-241. Release of vote tally -- penalty. (1) A person may not make public the results of a vote tally from a precinct until after the polls close as provided in 13-1-106. (a) A person who knowingly violates subsection (1) shall be imprisoned in the state prison for a term not to exceed 2 years or be fined an amount not less than \$100,000 and not more than \$500,000 or both.

(b) For the purposes of this section "knowingly" has the meaning specified in 45-2-101.






