8-Year-Old Watford City Girl Donates **Steer To Local Food Pantry**



Gov. Gianforte Contributes Salary To Pregnancy Support Center

of the Governor SIDNEY – On the ninth day of his 12 Days of Giving campaign, Governor Greg Gianforte contributed a quarter of his annual salary to Sunrise Women's Clinic, a pregnancy support center

serving eastern Montana. In October 2020, the governor committed to Montanans he would contribute his salary as governor to nonprofit organizations and charities in the state.

"For more nearly 15 years, Sunrise Women's Clinic has provided care and resources to young mothers and families," Gov. Gianforte said. "As we continue our 12 Days of Giving, I'm proud to support the nonprofit with its mission to support Montana mothers and stronger families.

Founded in Sidney, the nonprofit crisis pregnancy center has served mothers and families for over 15

At the clinic, licensed medical staff, advocates, and volunteers provide free health care services such as ultrasounds and pregnancy tests, as well as information to women and families including pregnancy and parenting support and services.

Additionally, the center serves growing families by providing new and gently used baby items for parents through its Baby Boutique. Families using clinic services are able to shop at the boutique at no cost to get needed items such as diapers, clothing, and baby tubs.

"Our goal is to empower these women and families and provide for them all the way through their pregnancy, and ultimately so

they know the only option is life," said Executive Director Stacey McNally. "For everyone who comes through our door, we want to offer hope. Family relationships are hard to build upon right now, it's hard to be a parent, and economic hardship is definitely reaching people here in a real hard way. so we want to be able to help people in every capacity,

This year, the clinic served over 1,100 visits, provided over 150 free ultrasounds, and accepted clients across eastern Montana and North Dakota. Partnering with over 52 churches and by providing classes at local high schools, Sunrise has expanded their outreach

and education across the region.

The Sunrise Pregnancy Resources and Family Outreach center relies on the generosity of Montanans to help women and families with pregnancy, postpartum support, and health needs. More information on the clinic may be found here.

On the 6th Day of Giving, the governor encouraged support for Montana law enforcement officers and their families through the Montana Police Protective Association Foundation.


On the 7th Day of Giving, the governor encouraged support for active duty and veteran Special Operations members through the Talons Reach Foundation.

Man In Custody **Following Pursuit** Of Stolen Vehicle In McKenzie County

While on patrol on Dec. 14, at approximately 9:14 p.m., a McKenzie County Sheriff's Office deputy attempted to stop a speeding vehicle on 4th Ave. NW, Watford City. The vehicle refused to stop and continued westbound, initiating a

A PIT maneuver was utilized in a field west of the Prairie View RV Park, however, the suspect vehicle was able to continue fleeing. The suspect vehicle continued driving through the Prairie View RV Park at speeds of 90 mph.

The pursuit continued onto U.S. Highway 85, where the suspect vehicle began traveling northbound. A second PIT maneuver was utilized, making the suspect vehicle spin out. The suspect vehicle struck a McKenzie County Sheriff's Office patrol vehicle while attempting to continue fleeing.

As a result of the perceived intentional striking of a patrol vehicle, another deputy with the McKenzie County Sheriff's Office struck the suspect vehicle in the rear. The suspect vehicle was then pushed into the ditch by the two damaged McKenzie County Sheriff's Office patrol vehicles. The driver, Michael JW Scott Emerson, surrendered without further incident.

At approximately 9:38 p.m., the registered owner of the vehicle called 911 to report their vehicle had been stolen while parked near the bars on Main Street in Watford City. The vehicle driven by Emerson was confirmed to be the reported stolen vehicle.

Sunday, the Rangers found themselves another two games. They started their day in the semi-finals face to face with the Hallock Rams out of Minnesota. The





This week, Fairview travels to Sidney on Dec. 17 and on Friday Dec. 20 the Warriors play at home against the Baker Spartans.




ServSafe Food Safety Manager Course **Available**

Winter weather is nothing new to those of us living in Eastern Montana, but the ice, snow and cold temperatures still combine to form some challenging obstacles. Slippery sidewalks and cold weather can easily cause a wide range of injuries for anyone but for seniors, a simple fall

on the ice often results in and change your clothes more than strained muscles. Taking some simple extra precautions can go a long way toward keeping you safe this winter.

Dress for the Weather - Wear loose layers of clothing. The air between the layers helps to keep you warm. Put on a hat and scarf; you lose a lot of body heat when your head and neck are uncovered. Wear a waterproof coat or jacket if it's snowy

right away if they get damp or wet. In very cold temperatures, make sure to cover all exposed skin and use a scarf to cover your nose and mouth.

Stay Hydrated - A variety of winter factors can cause moisture to leave our bodies quickly, leading to dehydration. Older adults are already at risk of dehydration because they naturally have less water in their bodies.

They're also more likely to have health conditions or take medicines that increase their risk of dehydration. Stay hydrated by drinking water throughout the day, especially if you are, or have recently been, ill with a fever, vomiting, or diarrhea.

Protect Your Skin As we age our skin becomes thinner, drier, and more fragile. Winter weather can take a toll on aging skin, causing cracking and bleeding, leading to infection. In addition to staying hydrated, older adults need to use moisturizing cream regularly; it is especially effective after bathing when the skin is most absorbent.

Avoid Slips and Falls Icy, snowy roads and sidewalks make it easy to slip and fall. Often these falls cause major injuries such as hip and wrist fractures, head trauma and major lacerations. Make sure steps and walkways are clear before you walk. Be especially careful if you see wet pavement that could be iced over. Clear way snow and salt your walkways at home or hire someone to do it for you. Wear boots with non-skid soles - this will prevent you from slipping. If you use a cane, replace the rubber tip before it is worn smooth. Upon returning home, remove your shoes immediately so you don't create wet floors which promote tripping hazards inside.

Keep the Car Tuned - "Winterize" your car before the really bad weather hits! This means having the antifreeze, tires,

and windshield wipers checked and changed if necessary. Remember your cell phone when you drive in bad weather and always let someone know where you are going and when you should be expected back. Avoid driving on icy roads and be especially careful driving on overpasses or bridges. Consider alternate routes, even if means driving a longer distance, if the more direct route is less safe. Often bigger roads are cleared of snow better than smaller ones. Stock your car with basic emergency supplies such as: water, dried food, flashlight, first aid kit, blankets, extra warm clothes, booster cables, windshield scraper, a shovel, and bag of sand or cat litter in case your wheels start spinning.

Winter injuries are more common that most people think; taking these extra precautions will help keep you safe so you can welcome 2025 with the best physical health possible. Remember, spring is only a few months away!



Grants Available To Schools Seeking To Add Trades Curricula

Williston, ND - Educators and school administrators in northwest North Dakota interested in bringing trades instruction to their high schools are encouraged to apply for the Schools to Skills grant through the Home Builders Institute (HBI)

HBI is the nation's leading educational resource for career technical education in the building industry. Their award-winning Pre-Apprenticeship Certificate Training (PACT) is one of only three pre-apprenticeship curricula recognized by the Department of Labor. Vetted by subject matter experts, PACT guarantees students will learn residential construction focused skills, receive hands-on training, and master the knowledge needed for employment in an entry-level job in the building industry.

Understanding the enormous need for skilled workers in the construction industry, HBI launched the Schools to Skills grant in 2019. This initiative provides schools with the resources to implement the PACT curriculum at no cost for two years. By removing financial barriers, HBI aims to make high-quality trades education accessible to more students across the country.

The two-year Schools to Skills grant program provides funding to assist secondary schools in creating or enhancing their construction trades programs. It provides a no-cost pathway toward industry-recognized certifications for middle school and high school students.

PACT Instructor Training and Certification is included in the program. Following the initial instructor certification, a mentorship period commences to provide continuous support and social learning opportunities alongside fellow instructors.

Industry-recognized certifications for students are available in 9 trade specific disciplines, including: Carpentry, Electrical, Plumbing, Brick Masonry, Landscaping, Painting & Finishing, Building Construction Technology, Weatherization, and HVAC.

HBI partners with the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB), its 140,000 members, and more than 700 state and local Home Builders Associations like Western Area Builders Association in northwest North Dakota to make programs like PACT available.


