In what is perhaps a first for Sidney Youth Rodeo, Montana State Junior High breakaway roping champion Lauren Youngquist is headed to Nationals in Des Moines, IA, the end of June where she will compete against girls from all over the U.S., five Canadian prov-

inces, Mexico and Australia. There are a total of 12 performances and she will compete Monday night, June 24 at 7 p.m. and Friday morning June 28 at 9 a.m. You can catch her performance on the Cowboy Channel+.

The daughter of J.C. and Kim Youngquist, Sidney, Lauren has been rodeoing



since the age of five but started breakaway roping about four years ago as a 5th grader.

Breakaway roping involves tying a string to the end of a rope which is tied to the saddle horn. The con-

testant ropes the calf around its neck, the calf keeps running until the string breaks, providing the time. Kim said that this event is the up and coming thing for women in rodeo. Since 2020, it has been held the day or two prior to the start of the NFR in Las Vegas, NV, each December but many in the field of women's rodeo are looking forward to it being held just like barrel racing or tie down roping during the NFR regular performances.

Lauren also competed in ribbon roping, barrel racing, goat tying and pole bending at State in Dillon, making it to the short go in

three out of five. According to her mom, Lauren had a rough start to the spring season as at the end of the fall season her horse, Olaf, suffered a fractured leg and had to be put down. She practiced this spring on her brother's calf horse and sister's breakaway horse. "Even though Lauren was faced with the obstacle of figuring out these new horses to her she never gave up," Kim said. "Having to work harder made winning this title even sweeter for

her. She was really determined to do this," she added proudly.

This isn't the first trip Youngquists have made to Nationals. Lauren's older brother, Garrett, attended as reserve champion calf roper, chute dogger and champion light rifle. Their younger daughter, Emma, who will be in 7th grade this fall also competes in breakaway roping and goat tying.

"I never rodeoed. I have a whole new appreciation of the sport," Kim stated. She thanked Kristin and Tim Larson and Cathy Wieferich for getting her kids involved in rodeo. "Kristin and Tim along with the Wieferich family are some of the biggest supporters of youth athletics. We are blessed to be in the Richland County Rodeo Club with them,' Kim said. She also encouraged everyone to come out this fall to the RCRC 46th Annual YRA, Jr. and High School Rodeo which will be Aug. 30-31at the Richland County Fairgrounds to watch youth from the ages of 5-18

Second Peak Of Fort Peck Flow Test Resuming

OMAHA, Neb. - Second peak of Fort Peck flow test resuming; Weekly flow test call scheduled for June 19

Releases from Fort Peck will begin stepping up as part of the second peak of the Fort Peck flow test starting today.

Releases from Fort Peck will be gradually increased, starting today, June 17, to reach a peak flow of 20,000 cubic feet per second at Wolf Point, on Sunday, June 23.

These releases will include flows from the Fort Peck spillway, beginning today around 9 a.m. (Mountain Time).

The second peak flow was scheduled to begin on June 13, but was delayed due to the stage forecast at Williston, being above 22.0 feet. https://water.noaa.gov/gauges/WLTN8

"Forecast flows on the Yellowstone River continue to decline and the river gage at Williston has dropped below 22.0 feet supporting a decision to proceed with the second peak flow beginning today, June 17th," said John Remus, Missouri Basin Water Management Division chief.

The rate of increase and decrease for the second peak will follow the original increase and decrease schedule. However, the peak flow measured at Wolf Point will be approximately 20,000 cfs, instead of the originally planned 22,500 cfs.

Releases will be made to hold at flows at Wolf Point of 20,000 cfs for three days, and then reduced by 1,000 cfs for 10 days, reaching 10,000 cfs on July 5.

On July 6, releases will be reduced to maintain a flow of 8,000 cfs at Wolf Point

Weekly virtual meetings during the flow test continue to take place to update the public on test progress and planned operations. Information on accessing the public meetings can be found at https://www.nwd.usace.army.mil/MRWM/Public-Meetings/Meetings

During the flow test a number of monitoring activities will be conducted to include fish monitoring, lidar and aerial photography, physical surveys, cultural resource surveys, and water quality sampling.

Therriault's first book, "Montana Curiosities", covered roadside attractions, unique events, and a couple hundred weird people, places and things across the state. Ten years and five books later, he continues to explore the state and bring home interesting stories. "Seven Montanas," which was published in October 2019 by TwoDot, drills down into each of the six regions of Montana to use a mix of journalism, essay and personal commentary to profile the area and the people who live there. Under the pseudonym Bob Wire, Therriault has

written and recorded five albums of original music, and traveled around the state for 25 years playing guitar in honky tonks and festivals, entertaining crowds and picking up local knowledge along the way.

Funding for Montana Conversations is provided by Humanities Montana through grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, Montana's Cultural Trust, and private donations. 

Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center Field Day June 27

The Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center (MSU EARC) is preparing to host their annual Field Day on Thursday, June 27 at the center, located north of Sidney, 1501 N Central Ave. The day will include information on variety selection, cropping systems, fertility, disease management, weed management, and more, all of which will be beneficial for producers in the region.

Plan to come from 8 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. for coffee and donuts before the field day begins at 8:30 a.m. During the field tours, Dr. Chengci Chen, EARC superintendent and professor of agronomy, will discuss camelina as a bioenergy crop, including variety selection, planting, and weed management of camelina.

With an increase in soybean acres in the area, plant pathologist Dr. Frankie Crutcher will be discussing white mold diseases; how to identify it, and management strategies including variety selection, fungicide application, and crop rotation. Throughout the field

day, Dr. Crutcher will also be discussing Fusarium head blight in spring wheat and durum including proper identification, resistant varieties, and the newest recommendations for a successful fungicide application.

Nisha Patwa, research associate, will discuss root

rot identification and seed treatments for Fusarium root rot management, as well as preliminary data of a study evaluating essential oils for root rot management.

Marie Dorval, PhD student at EARC will be discussing Ascochyta disease management during the Field Day. Her research study focuses on the impact of fungicide applications in monocrop and intercropping systems on disease control and seed quality. Dorval will also be sharing some preliminary data.

Other topics during the day will include variety

information on dry bean, soybean, barley, and spring wheat, as well as cornbased cropping system, and pulse crop protein breeding and genetics. Whether you are interested in learning more about pest and disease management, cropping systems, or new varieties,

the MSU EARC Field Day will provide valuable research updates to assist area producers.

The day will also include a meal and will wrap up by 1 p.m. Pesticide points are pending.



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
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Dr. Crutcher To Make Two Presentations Critical To Growers At Field Day June 27

Associate Professor of Plant Pathology, MSU-EARC Dr. Frankie Crutcher will discuss how to accurately identify white mold disease in irrigated soybean production fields and will provide management options including variety selection, fungicide application and rotation strategies at from 9:20-9:35 a.m.

She said white mold disease has been found in soybean fields in Richland County, raising concern among growers. Producers have been experimenting with new crops since the closure of Sidney Sugars, resulting in more soybeans being grown in the area. However, the mold she is seeing is in fields have been planted with soybeans for several years.

Crutcher will focus on providing new growers the means to identify and control the disease with quick and accurate diagnosis and the best ways to deal with it.

Crutcher will also dis-

cuss the identification and management of Fusarium head blight from 10:35-10:50

She stated that if the wet, humid weather conditions continue, there will be a high risk of head blight for cereal producers growing spring wheat and barley. Growers will have the perfect opportunity to hear the most up to date information at the time when cereal grains will be flowering and most susceptible, making it the best time for spray application. She will discuss what fungicides and which spray tips work best to control the disease.

She will also introduce growers to the newly released head blight resistant variety of spring wheat and discuss how it has performed in the MSU-EARC nursery for the past several years.

Dr. Crutcher has been a plant pathologist at the MSU Eastern Ag Research Center in Sidney since 2016.

She leads a multifaceted research program focused on developing IPM strategies for fungal pathogens of pulse crops and cereals. Her current research includes evaluating varieties for disease resistance, directing fungicide efficacy trials, improving methods of crop disease detection, and understanding how agronomic practices such as utilizing cover crops, crop rotation, and planting date contribute to disease development.

At this year's Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center Field Day in Sidney, MT, Dr. Nisha Patwa will be discussing her ongoing research into the effects of essential oil treatments in combating root rot in peas.

Organic growers are ever in search of improving their ability to produce crops with a solution in harmony with their organic status. Widespread root rot due to a buildup of the pathogen in soil led researchers at Montana State University to experiment with essential oil to control root rot in peas. In greenhouse research, it has shown effective, and she hopes to test it now in the field. Trials are currently underway to see if it has "real world" potential as an organic root rot combatant.
















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MSU, ARS Labs Team Up For Dryland Field Tour July 17

Battling wheat stem sawfly? Interested in forages or CRP native plantings? How about forages potentially resistant to grasshoppers or rotations that help curb disease in peas and lentils? These are just a few of the research projects being featured at a joint Dryland Field Day, presented by Montana State University's Eastern Ag Research Center (EARC) and the USDA Agricultural Research Service's (ARS) Northern Plains Agricultural Research Lab (NPARL). The tour is set for Wednesday morning, July 17 and features speakers from both research facilities and the Mandan, ND ARS facility, as well as forage specialists from the University of Wisconsin and the Madison, WI ARS research laboratory.

The combined half-day activities begin at the ARS research farmsite located about 4 miles north of Sidney on the Culbertson highway. Take a left at County Road 129 and a second left on County Road 346 to get to the farmsite. Registration opens at 8:45 a.m. with coffee and donuts followed by the start of the tour at 9 a.m. The tour will subsequently move to the MSU dryland farm across the highway for additional research talks and conclude with a free lunch at 12:30 p.m. sponsored by the Richland County Extension Office. Everyone is welcome to participate. Note, pesticide applicator points are pending for the event.

This is the first time in the last five years that the joint tour has been held and it's coming back as an every-other-year event. Covid restrictions and then staff shortages delayed its reintroduction until now, according to field day organizers. "We're looking forward to renewing this partnership," NPARL Dryland Agronomist Brett Allen said in announcing the resumption. "We regularly participate in the EARC irrigated field day, but we also share adjoining dryland research space with EARC and work together on projects there as well, so it only made sense to renew the dryland tour to jointly share our research findings with area dryland producers."

Speakers and topics for the field day are still being finalized, but in addition to the subjects noted above tour goers can learn more about research examining:

The effect of slow-release N fertilizers on spring wheat yield, quality and more

Pulse crops and protein

Soil microbial communities and disease resistance in eas.

Pollinator research and the impacts of grasshopper spraying on pollinators



Great Shrub Options For Your Outdoor Landscape

As summer arrives, people often spend their first days trying to enjoy the outdoor environment. There are plenty of outdoor activities to enjoy in our region. After summer sets in, people are often looking to make some improvements to their outdoor spaces. One of many things people look to work on is their home. Foundation plantings can really improve the look of a home. There are many great shrub options for our region that can add a lot of interest to the landscape. We'll take a quick look at a few of those items in this article.

Among the easiest shrubs to grow in our climate are Potentilla. There are many varieties of potentilla but all of them lend themselves well to foundation planting. Potentilla generally are modest in size achieving a maximum height of around 3 ft. Perhaps, the most attractive attribute of potentilla lies in their bloom time.

While most plants that are year-after-year plants, do not bloom the entire summer season, potentilla tend to break that rule. Beginning in early June, they start their show of flowers. These flowers are roughly the size of a quarter. In a very short

time, they fill these shrubs with masses of summer color lasting from the time they begin in June until the time the frost arrives in the fall. Potentilla are available in many bloom colors but unquestionably the most famous is yellow.

Another great option for foundation plantings are Spirea. Spirea also have a modest height which lends them well to the topic of foundation plantings. A maximum of around 3 ft is usually for many Spirea varieties. But watch yourself, there are the occasional Renaissance and Snowmound spirea that can break the 4-5 ft mark. There are increasing varieties of spirea to choose from. Many of the hybrids have foliage that begins one color, usually red, and matures greener as the summer progresses.

The Little Princess spirea, a green foliage option, is always a strong choice in foundation plantings. Spirea generally bloom for most of June. Japanese spirea are usually first with some of the hybrid forms following after; sometimes closer to the Fourth of July.

Spirea are much more like your average perennial or shrub. As you may recall, most shrubs and perennials don't bloom continually, in the way that potentilla do. What they lack in blooms,

they make up for in fall foliage. Spirea have a knockout fall foliage. As fall arrives, they take on molten tones of oranges and reds. They're extremely striking!


Last, in our groups of foundation plantings, I'll choose to share shrub roses. There are so many varieties of roses. All with varying degrees of hardiness. Many wish to try many of the Hybrid Tea Rose varieties that you may find at the box stores. Unfortunately, they are often not likely to succeed in our region. Instead, I choose to reach for the Morden series of roses.

Originally released by the Morton Arboretum in Canada, these tough roses are known as "own root" roses. All of the Morden series are reliable choices for foundation plantings.

the great thing about roses, if they are dead-headed, is that they will bloom the entire summer. In addition to the Morden series, the Hansa, Rugosa, and Pavement roses (Snow Pavement and Purple Pavement) all have a fragrance that is simply to die for!

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

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
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NRA Foundation Awards \$7,300 In Equipment To Richland County 4-H
