Construction Substantially Complete On Fairview West Project

FAIRVIEW - The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) and Wickens Construction Inc. are wrapping up major operations on the Fairview West project.

The Fairview West proj-

ect reconstructed six miles of Montana Highway 201 (MT 201), including two miles of new alignment north of Fairview. As part of the realignment, a new intersection was constructed at MT 201 and Montana Highway 200 (MT 200) north of town,

which is expected to reduce commercial traffic congestion in Fairview and enhance motorist safety.

"We're happy to be finishing another successful construction season," said Wickens Construction, Inc. Project Manager Mike Lutes.

"We're grateful to everyone who slowed down and kept an eye out for our crews in the construction zones."

The senior class of Alexander, ND, led by Amber Severson, Alexander Public School social sciences teacher, want their classmates and community to understand not only how important voting is, but every factor in the process. Working in 5 separate teams, they put together slideshows to show their classmates, which varied depending on grade level, and had the Alexander School bus to take them and any interested community members to the Cartwright, ND, voting station Nov. 5.

Team Who, consisting of William Richards, Jordan Hernandez, and Paiten Iverson, covered all the candidates on the ballot for this November's Federal, State, County, and Local elections, for both Montana and North Dakota.

Team Why, with Paige Delaney, Ellie Johnson, and Julia Bonsteel working together, shared why voting is so important and how one vote really does make a difference. They found that from 1976 to Jan. 5, 2021, more than 85 senate elections were decided by less than 3% of all votes cast. Local elections matter most, carrying their impact down the line to the state and Federal level.

Team When, made up of Shane Cross, McKenzie Suko, and Chanel Chavez, explained how often we are given the opportunity to vote. General elections are held every two years, and presidential elections are held every four years. Primaries are held in June, and the presidential the first Tuesday in November; this year was on the 5th.

Team Where, comprised of Brooke Rykhus, Alexys Pownall, Olivia Vagle, and Jadyn Henglefelt, found and listed all the locations in McKenzie, Williams, and Richland counties where your vote can be taken and counted in elections.

Team How, included Sean Alfaro, Mya Torres, and Kaylee Waltke and researched how to go about voting once at a polling place. In North Dakota, you do not need to register to vote but will need a valid ID such as your driver's license. In Montana, you are required to register in order to vote. If you are not able to vote at a polling place on election day, you have the option to use an absentee ballot. Some states require a reason to use an absentee ballot, such as travel, disability or illness, work, deployment, or religion.

While the goal of the class's Public Service Announcement was to educate their peers and community, they also found it informative for themselves, as some are now old enough to carry the responsibility of voting and soon will be moving onto their adult lives after graduation. They will be holding their own mock election and have enjoyed the spirited debates and sharing of opinions and perspectives on different aspects of voting and the upcoming elections. They were excited to take part in this election, and hope every eligible citizen was as well.



ments, including the reconstruction of the intersection with County Road 350. Further enhancements provided drivers with wider roadways and shoulders, better sight distance, updated and restored pavement markings, and improved signage to safely guide travelers to their destinations.

Roundabouts work well at intersections like the junction of MT 201 and MT 200, where traffic volumes fluctuate throughout the day. By eliminating the need for vehicles to come to a complete stop, roundabouts promote continuous traffic flow during all hours. Drivers simply slow down, look to their left, and merge into the roundabout before traveling around the circle towards their destination.

In the next few weeks, please watch out for crews finishing up shoulder work, like seeding, installing signs, and installing guardrail.

Project Manager Jerry Phillips, MDT Glendive District, expressed appreciation for motorists who were vigilant during the past two construction seasons. "Our road crews worked diligently and safely, but they can only do so much without the attention and care of drivers. We thank everyone who slowed down and respected the 'cone zone' to help protect workers as traffic passed through the project area. We're glad to be on the home stretch and would appreciate your continued caution next spring when we are back out here to chip seal."

Crews will return next spring to apply seal and cover (chip seal) and permanent roadway markings. MDT will get in touch with the schedule and anticipated impacts closer to work resuming.

Biden EV Mandate Bad For Montana Ranching & Farming

As a longtime rancher and legislator, protecting rural Montanans from legislation that infringes upon economic liberties and promotes government interference is my top priority. This is why I vehemently oppose the Biden administration's new tailpipe emissions rule.

The rule dictates that by 2032, at least 56% of new vehicle sales must be Electric Vehicles (EVs). This will severely hurt Montana ranchers, farmers, and workers by increasing personal expenditures to comply with the EPA mandate.

Requiring Montana families to purchase electric cars and/or trucks is simply unfair, especially with the lack of reliability and affordability of these vehicles. With little to no affordable EV options and being forced to travel greater distances for sufficient recharge, this rule cuts into ranchers' and farmers' ability to live with

I urge Senator Tester to stand with Montana ranchers and farmers and oppose the EPA's federal overreach

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





The top-ranked Warriors sprinted to a 28-7 first quarter lead and extended that lead to 57-14 at half-time. The final score ended up at 70-21.



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
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Kendel Hofer Hunting Legacy

One of five sisters, Kendel Hofer, Williston, ND, had years of duck hunting under her belt before she could even lift a shotgun. Today, she can say she has bagged bucks by bow in North Dakota, elk hunted in Montana, brought down snow geese, and even watched her dad successfully hunt stag in New Zealand.

Her grandfather,

Charles Nehring, made hunting a family priority. Both he and his wife, Persis, were excellent shots, competition winning even for his part. Her grandmother encouraged the girls by "cleaning" their faux play game, and everything they packed home from their early hunting adventures, from pigeons to gophers. Kendel fondly remembers pretending to duck hunt with her

siblings while her dad and grandfather did the actual shooting, and younger sisters falling asleep amongst the reeds while they waited.

Every fall, her grandpa picked her up early from school for deer opener. Helping his granddaughters fill their tags was a point of pride for him. Once after helping Kendel push brush for a buck she had scouted all summer, he made sure

to tell her that he could have shot him, but out of love for her, didn't. He had choice words however when ducks were shot out from under him; even as his sight failed from cataracts.

Family vacations were almost always a hunting trip growing up, and even as an adult they still choose to make them so. Last fall, the Nehring-Hofer family sacrificed two elk hunting seasons to travel to New Zealand to fulfill her father, Dennis Nehring's, dream of hunting stag. The successful hunt was well worth passing on last and this fall's elk season, and they are looking forward to a full season of

pheasant hunting close to home.

Kendel loves bird hunting behind a dog, and grew up with Chesapeake Bay Retrievers, and then Labrador Retrievers. They transitioned to hunting German Shorthaired Pointers at one point, and today she hunts a German Wirehaired Pointer named Hatchet. Hatchet is a bit more laid back than a German Shorthair in her opinion, and the thicker coat helps her with waterfowl conditions as well. Her dad often steals Hatchet for his own hunts.





Hunters Encouraged To Have Deer Tested For CWD

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department will continue its Hunter-Harvested Surveillance program during the 2024 hunting season by sampling deer for chronic wasting disease from select units in the northeastern portion of the state.

Samples will be tested from deer taken from units 1, 2C, 2D, 2E, 2F1, 2K1, 2K2, 2L, 3A4 and 3B2. Outside of this area, hunters can still have their animal tested by taking it to a Game and Fish district office, deer head collection site or by using a self-sampling kit.

CWD is a slow-moving brain disease of deer, moose and elk that can cause population-level impacts under high infection rates.

Hunters are encouraged to drop off heads of adult or yearling deer at collection locations listed on the department's website at gf.nd.gov. Fawns and head-

shot deer cannot be tested. Hunters wishing to keep the heads can bring them to a Game and Fish district office during business hours to have them sampled.

Self-sampling kits are available for hunters who wish to have their deer tested but are unable to drop the head at a collection site. The do-it-yourself kit allows hunters to remove the lymph nodes and ship them to the department's wildlife health lab for testing.

Results can be expected within four weeks and will be sent to your Game and Fish My Account inbox.

Hunters should note that carcass disposal requirements apply statewide. The entire carcass can be transported outside of the gun unit where it was harvested. If transported out of the gun unit, the carcass waste (material left after processing) must be disposed of via landfill or waste management provider. This requirement does not apply to heads dropped at CWD collection sites, or lymph nodes submitted for CWD surveillance

Game and Fish Monitoring EHD-related Mortality

Since late August, wildlife biologists have been monitoring scattered reports of white-tailed deer found dead in a portion of southwestern North Dakota. Epizootic hemorrhagic disease was confirmed in a number of these cases.

"EHD is a viral disease transmitted by biting gnats," said Dr. Charlie Bahnson, Game and Fish wildlife veterinarian. "We see a low level of EHD most years. It

typically stays fairly localized, but every so often it can intensify into a significant die-off. The combined outbreak in 2020 and 2021 was probably the worst in memory, with extensive mortality across much of western North Dakota. So far, we're nowhere close to that level, but we have received around 20 reports, primarily focused across northern Stark County. We're hopeful that cold temperatures over the weekend will help slow things down, but it typically takes a series of hard frosts to kill the gnats and completely end an outbreak."

Game and Fish is asking for assistance to better track the extent and severity of this year's outbreak. The public is encouraged to report any sick or dead deer through an online reporting system.

"In some cases, we may need to collect samples off fresh carcasses, so please notify the department as soon as possible," Bahnson said Hunters should report any dead deer along with photos, if possible, to the Game and Fish Department through the online wildlife mortality reporting system at gf.nd.gov/mortality-report.

EHD primarily affects white-tailed deer, but other big game species are susceptible. The virus is not a danger to humans, however, hunters should not shoot or consume a deer that appears sick.

Some Whitetail Hunters Can Seek Refunds

The state Game and Fish Department is allowing hunters with whitetail or "any" deer gun licenses in several units in western North Dakota the option of turning those licenses in for

Casey Anderson, wildlife chief, said the decision is

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based on scattered reports of white-tailed deer mortality caused by epizootic hemorrhagic disease that began in late August.

Hunters with antlered whitetail, antlerless whitetail, any antlered and any antlerless licenses, are eligible for refunds in units 3D1, 3D2, 3E1, 4B, 4C, and 4D. Hunters who return their licenses

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will have their bonus points restored, if applicable, to the same number of points prior to the 2024 deer gun lottery.

"Compared to previous years, this outbreak appears mild and less extensive," Anderson said. "However, it's possible that some hunters could notice an impact in localized areas."

Department staff will continue to monitor reports to determine if licenses in additional units should become eligible for refunds due to the EHD outbreak. Hunters and landowners should report any dead deer along with photos, if possible, to the department through the online wildlife mortality reporting system, at gf.nd. gov/mortality-report.

Before deciding to turn in a license, Anderson urges license holders to make local contacts to find out the extent of mortality in their hunting unit.

"Most areas within these units have not been heavily affected and a good deer harvest is still needed," he said. "But a little scouting and a phone call or two will help to make an informed decision."

License holders who qualify and want a refund must mail their tag, along with a note requesting a refund due to EHD, to the Game and Fish Department's Bismarck office no later than Nov. 8. Envelopes postmarked Nov. 8 will be accepted.

EHD, a naturally occurring virus that is spread by a biting midge, is often fatal to infected white-tailed deer, while mule deer do not usually die from the disease. Hunters do not have to worry about handling or consuming meat from infected deer because the virus that causes EHD is not known to cause disease in humans. In addition, the first series of hard frosts typically kills the midge that transmits the EHD virus and will slow or halt the spread of the disease.

Hunters, Recreationists Asked to be Aware of Fire Conditions

State wildlife and outdoor recreation agency officials said a weekend of historic fires in western North Dakota delivered a stark reminder to hunters and other outdoor enthusiasts about the need to be acutely aware of dry conditions while recreating outdoors.

While the need to be aware of the daily fire index is standard for hunters and state park visitors in North Dakota in fall, it's especially true now considering the conditions and the fact that many hunters will be in the field for the pheasant season opener and hundreds of campers will visit North Dakota state parks this weekend.

"While hunters are always our eyes and ears in North Dakota's rural areas in fall, it will be especially true this weekend with the highly anticipated pheasant season opening," said Jeb Williams, North Dakota Game and Fish Department Director. "We encourage hunters who spot a fire caused by whatever means to report the situation immediately to law enforcement officials. We also encourage hunters to carry fire extinguishers, shovels, water and other tools. And it goes without saying to extinguish and discard smoking materials appropriately, not from a vehicle."

Williams added that individuals who are not trained fire-fighters should not attempt to fight a fire that is out of control.

"Anyone recreating outdoors is asked to remain vigilant as dry conditions and wildfire risk remains high," said North Dakota Parks and Recreation Director Cody Schulz. "We are grateful for the numerous first responders, local officials, and landowners for their efforts to battle these wildfires, and we encourage everyone that if they see something – a spark that ignites nearby grasses, or smoke in any vegetation or trees – to say something immediately by calling 9-1-1."

An elevated fire danger index in most counties will likely influence outdoor activities. The most current wildfires and fire danger index can be found at NDResponse.gov. Conditions can change daily depending on temperature, wind and precipitation forecasts.

For those recreating outdoors this fall:

- Be aware of current burn restrictions.

- Make sure your chains aren't dragging when hauling boats, campers or trailers.

- Don't drive or park vehicles on dry grass - this includes OHVs.

- Never leave campfires unattended and be sure they are completely extinguished.

The daily rural fire danger index is issued by the National Weather Service to alert the public to conditions that may be conducive to the accidental starting or spread of fires. In addition, county governments have the authority to adopt penalties for violations of county restrictions related to burning bans. These restrictions apply regardless of the daily fire danger index and remain in place until each county's commission rescinds the ban.





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Prevent Wildfires While Operating ATVs And UTVs

NDSU Extension, the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department and the North Dakota Game and Fish Department remind all ATV and UTV drivers to help prevent wildfires when operating ATVs and UTVs.

All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and utility-terrain vehicles (UTVs) can be a great resource for work or play for many user groups across North Dakota. However, due to the high fire risk in many locations across the state, they can also be a cause of concern if precautions are

not followed while operating. To protect people and property, NDSU Extension, the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department, and the North Dakota Game and Fish Department are encouraging ATV and UTV owners to practice fire prevention techniques to prevent injuries and fire risks.

"All it takes is one spark to start a fire, whether that occurs while driving an ATV or UTV in a crop field, riding a fence line with tall, dead grass, or from simply parking the vehicle in an area with tall grass," says Angie Johnson, North Dakota State University Extension farm and ranch safety coordinator. "Focusing on personal safety, such as

always wearing a helmet during every ATV ride, and always wearing your seatbelt when driving and riding as a passenger in a UTV is incredibly important, but we must also be diligent in protecting property by practicing fire prevention techniques with our vehicles."

Since ATVs and UTVs are used in agricultural, recreational and hunting settings, all ATV and UTV operators are asked to place personal and fire safety first during every ride - no matter the purpose of your ATV/ UTV ride.

"We all play a role in preventing wildfires, especially under current conditions," says Tony Hillig, North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department division chief. "To stay vigilant, we ask all riders to stay on designated trails, respect fire restrictions and keep your vehicle well-maintained to reduce the risk of starting a wildfire."

North Dakota Game and Fish Department communications supervisor, Greg Freeman, agrees that all ATV and UTV operators must work together to protect our resources.

"Always know what the fire danger index and county burn restrictions are in your area before venturing out into the field," says Freeman. "If you see something, report the situation immediately to law enforcement authorities."

To identify the burn restrictions in your area, visit https://ndresponse.gov/ burn-restrictions-fire-danger-maps.

Fire prevention recommendations when using ATVs and UTVs:

- Be sure chains and other metal parts are not dragging from your vehicle, as they can they throw sparks.
- Check your tire pressure. Driving on an exposed wheel rim can cause sparks.
- Stay on trails and avoid riding or parking in tall grass. Hot exhaust pipes can start the grass on fire. You may not even notice the fire until it is too late.

 Never let your brake pads wear too thin as metal-on-metal causes sparks. Make sure your spark arrester is installed and free of carbon build up.

- Riders should carry a shovel and a water source or fire extinguisher when operating in high- or extremely-high fire conditions.

Johnson also encourages ATV and UTV owners to keep their vehicles clean to ensure rider safety and fire prevention.

"Take the time to clean your ATVs and UTVs, as plant seeds, leaves and stems can accumulate in certain areas of the machine, such as the undercarriage, frame and even the exhaust system, leading to an increased risk of fire," says Johnson.

Review the owner's manual for the machine to determine the best steps for cleaning the machine, being mindful of electrical components that may be sensitive to moisture.

"Heavy use of an ATV or UTV often leads to accumulation of debris, which can mask mechanical problems that could be easily identified on clean vehicles," states Johnson. "Cleaning the vehicle to perform a regular check-up for maintenance and to reduce risk of fire hazards is a good practice. It also helps the operator ensure that the machine is

in good condition for a safe riding experience."

While geared towards preventing the spread of crop pests, such as noxious and invasive weed seeds, NDSU Extension's fact sheet on ATV cleanup and sanitation at ndsu. ag/ATVcleaning, contains helpful guidance on cleaning procedures for all ATV and UTV owners, which can also help prevent fires.

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
