Public Hearing On City Of Sidney Proposed Budget Set For Sept. 3

A public hearing on the City of Sidney's proposed budget will be on the top of the agenda during their regularly scheduled meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 3 at City Hall.

Fee assessment includes garbage, street lighting, street maintenance, snow removal and street sweeping. Included in the budget is a rate increase for garbage from \$200 per year to \$250 per year or \$4.17 per month. Secretary/treasurer Jessica Chamberlin explained that the increase is due to the jump in garbage truck replacement costs from \$230.000 to over \$400,000 per truck. The city is on a 2-year replacement program. Since it is the mechanical parts like the arms of the truck that wear out, they are now looking at replacing the bodies every two years, then having to replace the truck in another two, thereby reducing costs. "This is a huge cost increase that we didn't anticipate," Chamberlin said. "We have been diligent about trying to save money to pay for the new trucks and so far keeping alive but even inflation didn't account for the increase."

Join Fort Union staff, historical reenactors, and traditional artisans in celebrating the Upper Missouri's fur trade story at one of the West's grandest historic sites.

Williston, ND – Get ready to step back in time as the much-anticipated Living History Day returns to the Upper Missouri.

The Fort Union Trading Post National Historic Site is set to come alive with the sights, sounds, and excitement of the American Frontier during the annual Living History celebration. On Aug. 31, 2024, from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. CT, visitors of all ages will have the opportunity to experience the rich history and vibrant culture of the fur trade era. Living History Day promises to transport attendees to a bygone era, immersing them in the skills and traditions of living on the early 19th century frontier. This living history event has become a staple for history enthusiasts, families, and adventurers alike, offering a unique educational and entertaining experience for all.

Visitors to Living History Day will enjoy artisan demonstrations of blacksmithing, spinning and weaving, historical medical tools and practices, hide preparation and tanning, tailoring, tinsmithing, glass plate photography, making moccasins, black powder shooting, kid's activities, and much more!

The park is also on social media! <u>https://www.facebook.</u> com/FortUnionTradingPost-NHS There is also a proposed \$20 increase for street maintenance and a \$25 increase for snow removal in the budget. The total expected increase in fees would be \$95 per year or just under \$8.00 per month.

Chamberlin highlighted the good things in the budget as well. Those include improvements at the tennis courts and turning part of them into pickle ball courts, something the city has been saving for. The city will be putting out a request for proposals on engineering as soon as the budget is approved. Under the new budget, the swimming pool would have concrete work and repainting done. The new water tower project is also in the budget with bids in 2024 and construction starting in the spring of '25. Over \$1 million in street improvements are scheduled for 2024-25 which is four times the usual amount. Most will be completed this fall using federal and state gas tax dollars. There is also \$1 million saved up for a new fire truck. "We've been saving for this for a long time," Chamberlin said.


Through Aug. 18, 2024, there have been 55 fatalities in 51 crashes on North Dakota roadways; over 16% of the crashes involved alcohol

## Richland County NRCS Encourages Planning Now For Conservation Benefits & Future Funding Opportunities

Sidney, MT – Montana's short summer is winding down and now is a good time for the USDA Natural **Resources Conservation** Service (NRCS) to conduct the field inventories and planning needed to develop a conservation plan for farmers, ranchers, and private forestland managers looking to improve their natural resources. Because the timeframe before snow is unpredictable and because the NRCS application ranking period for funding opportunities usually happens in the fall, visit the Sidney field office now.

The local NRCS staff can help to figure out current problems, assess the condition of the land, and determine options for improvement all based on individual operational goals. A conservation plan is a customized collaboration between the planner and the customer. A final plan may include land use maps, soils information, inventory data, recommended practices, and other tools and resources to help landowners make management changes or install other conservation practices.

In Richland County, conservation funding is available for the following programs and initiatives, in addition to statewide and national opportunities.

Conversion of Expired Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Acres to Healthy Grazing Lands Targeted Implementation Plan (TIP): The purpose of this project is to keep 7,500 expired/expiring CRP acres in perennial vegetative cover and to assist producers in converting these acres into productive livestock grazing lands to improve ecological function and address livestock feed and forage concerns. There are 32,825 acres of land in CRP contracts that will have expired or will be expiring in Richland County from 2020-2024. These acres are at risk for conversion to annual cropland. This TIP covers 32,174 of those acres and provides focused assistance to producers who wish to convert land formerly enrolled in CRP to grazing lands. Eligible practices include wells, pumps, livestock pipeline, tanks, fence, and prescribed grazing. The TIP area encompasses all of Richland County, but land offered for enrollment must have expired from the CRP program in 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023, or will expire in 2024. **Richland County Mis**souri River Watershed Irrigators TIP: Irrigated cropland systems perform best when soil function and irrigation efficiency are maximized. To achieve that goal, NRCS will offer financial incentives to producers who agree to implement soil health and irrigation efficiency practices. Practices that are eligible include Residue Management -No-till, Cover Crop, Conservation Crop Rotation, Soil Health Testing, Sprinkler Irrigation, Irrigation Pipeline, Pumping Plant, and Irrigation Water Management. Irrigation practices are only eligible on land that has an irrigation history (irrigated 2 out of the last 5 years). Taking Soil Health to the Next Level - Miles City Area TIP: The goal of this TIP is to improve soil health on cropland by maximizing soil cover and minimizing soil disturbance. This will be achieved by using Conservation Harvest Management (CHM), coupled with no-till where needed, to address the soil aggregate instability and naturally available moisture resource concerns that have been created through low soil cover and disturbance. The implementation of this TIP, primarily through the use of CHM by using stripper headers, will improve soil aggregate stability by increasing soil cover. As a result, moisture use will be more efficient as more water is stored and captured and not lost to evaporation since the soil will be more protected by residue. With improved soil aggregate stability soil can take in and store more water and is less susceptible to erosion.


Migratory Bird Resurgence Initiative: The Migratory Bird Resurgence Initiative (MBRI), is aimed at preserving, protecting, and improving habitat for migratory waterfowl, shorebirds, neotropicals, and other avian species in the Prairie Pothole Region. Prairie pothole wetlands provide critical food and habitat for these species. The initiative is focused on unmanipulated wetlands of two acres or less within working cropland as identified on the National Wetland Inventory. NRCS will work with applicants to determine which wetlands are eligible based on the National Wetlands Inventory. Once the wetlands are deemed eligible, producers will then decide which of the three available levels of management is appropriate for their operation.

# FWP Requests That Recreationists Be On Lookout For Greater Short-horned Lizards This Fall

#### By Montana FWP -Region 6

GLASGOW - As you are hunting, hiking, and exploring Montana this fall, be sure to take a break from scanning the horizon and look down at the ground once in a while. Not only will this help you avoid stepping on a cactus or a rattlesnake, but you might also see one of eastern Montana's rarely seen critters...the greater short-horned lizard, commonly known as a "horny toad." If you do, Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks would like to know about it.

The greater shorthorned lizard, Phrynosoma hernandesi, was once considered the second most abundant reptile along the Missouri River in Montana in the late 19th Century, second only to the western rattlesnake. Currently, however, these lizards are considered a 'Species of Greatest Inventory Need' in Montana due to insufficient data on their population and distribution.

According to Nicole Hussey, FWP wildlife biologist in Region 6, "We have been conducting surveys in eastern Montana to try and determine status and distribution as well as fill in data gaps; however, their elusive nature and cryptic coloration make them extremely difficult to locate."

"This is where we can use hunters and other outdoor recreationists' help," continued Hussey, "because oftentimes, people just accidentally come across one."

Hussey and other biologists are seeking the help of folks out trekking around the countryside to provide incidental observations in addition to their structured survey efforts.

### **PLOTS Guide Online**

#### By ND Game & Fish

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department's Private Land Open To Sportsmen Guide for 2024 is now available online at the Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov.

The guide will feature about 836,000 PLOTS acres. Because PLOTS tracts can be added or removed from the program throughout the year, hunters are encouraged to use the Game and Fish mobile app or other mapping and browser-based applications to locate and identify these tracts. Map sheets are updated weekly on the department's website.

The PLOTS guide features maps highlighting these walk-in areas, identified in the field by inverted triangular yellow signs, as well as other public lands.

To maximize the use of hunter dollars, fewer signs will be placed on PLOTS tracts in the future. The cost savings will be directed to the addition of more habitat and access.

The free printed PLOTS guides will be available in late August at most license vendors and other locations throughout the state.

The guides are not available by mail, so hunters will have to pick one up at a local vendor or Game and Fish offices, or print individual maps from the website. "If you happen to observe one anywhere in the state," says Hussey, "please record the location, get GPS coordinates if possible, and note the date, number observed, and take a photo with something in the picture for scale if you can."

Observations can be reported to your local FWP biologist.

A few things about the greater short-horned lizard: Key ID:

Adult greater shorthorned lizards are diurnal, meaning they are most active during the warmer daylight hours.

Coloration is cryptic with the soil (blends in) and can vary by locality.

The broad, flattened body separates this lizard from the other three lizard species regularly documented in Montana, and the range overlaps only with the common sagebrush lizard, which is much more slender. The head has a "heart-

shaped" appearance when viewed from above. They are usually easi-

est to spot when they move and catch your eye. Habitat:

Greater short-horned lizards are found in the eastern half of Montana, but in scattered locations throughout their range.

They are often found on south or east-facing slopes of coulees and ridge tops, and some open flats.

They prefer habitats with sagebrush, creeping juniper, or rabbitbrush with sparse bunch grass, patches of bare ground, and shalelike soil. They are even found in some ponderosa pine stands.

Although they seem like they would make a good pet, after you get a quick picture and GPS location, please leave these fascinating critters where you find them!

# **HIP Registration**

Migratory bird hunters of all ages need to register with the Harvest Information Program prior to hunting ducks, geese, swans, mergansers, coots, cranes, snipe, doves and woodcock. Hunters must register in each state they are licensed to hunt.

Hunters can HIP certify when purchasing a license by visiting the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov.

Those who registered to hunt during the spring light goose conservation order in North Dakota do not have to register with HIP again, as it is required only once per year.

HIP registration is a cooperative program designed to determine a sample of hunters to measure harvest of migratory birds for management purposes.

# **Governor Gianforte, FWP Increase Public Access & Conservation On 50,000 Acres In Eastern Montana**

### Montana conservation groups celebrate approval of eight habitat conservation leases

HELENA, MT – As chair of the Montana Land Board, Governor Greg Gianforte led the state's purchase of more than 50,000 acres of habitat conservation leases (HCL) to increase public access. keep agricultural land in production, and conserve prairie habitats.

With the support of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks (FWP), conservation groups, and farmers and ranchers, the governor and members of the land board celebrated the approval to purchase eight private properties to enroll as HCLs.

"Our top priority will continue to be to increase public access while preserving our treasured lands and habitats for generations to come," Gov. Gianforte said. "Through habitat conservation leases, we're providing conservation incentives to landowners, supporting our leading industries, and protecting our way of life."

HCLs are a voluntary, incentive-based agreement with private landowners that help ensure high-priority habitats are conserved while traditional agricultural activities, primarily livestock grazing, continue. Landowners commit to retaining wildlife habitats for 30 or 40-year terms.

"Our Habitat Conservation Lease Program benefits all Montanans," FWP Director Dustin Temple said. "Ensuring the protection of critical habitat is central to our mission at FWP. We do this in partnership with private landowners and the agriculture industry by using conservation tools that work for them. Habitat leases are one way we help landowners protect habitat that are important to the wildlife we all cherish."

These eight eastern Montana HCLs total 51,635 acres and are valued at over \$6 million. Of the leases approved, six will be completely funded by Habitat Montana and two will be split between Habitat Montana and FWP's Migratory Bird Wetland Program. Currently, FWP administers 51 leases totaling 330,193 acres.

Several conservation groups joined the governor and FWP director in praising the enrollment.

The Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership (TRCP) Interim Chief Conservation Officer Joel Webster said, "TRCP appreciates the leadership of the Montana Land Board to maintain private working lands, enhance sportsmen's access, and conserve fish and wildlife habitat through the approval of eight Habitat Conservation Leases. Habitat Conservation Leases have real merit, and TRCP welcomes this additional tool in the box that will help Montanans maintain our agricultural and sporting heritage."

The Boone and Crockett Club Chief Executive Officer Tony Schoonen added, "The Boone and Crockett Club applauds the addition of 50,000 acres of habitat leases in Eastern Montana and appreciate the leadership of Governor Gianforte, FWP, and the Land Board to make this a reality. These term easements are an important tool for wildlife managers and landowners, and we are excited to see more of them being purchased. The Habitat Conservation leasing program promotes wildlife conservation, keep working lands working, and provide public hunting access and we are proud to support it."

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation Executive Director Blake Henning said, "As a longtime active proponent of conservation, habitat stewardship and hunting, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation applauds the implementation of these habitat conservation leases. They incentivize wildlife management and conservation as well as public hunting access on private working lands. We are glad this tool is being put to good use, and we appreciate the leadership of the governor, FWP and the Land Board in approving this latest investment of Habitat Montana and Montana Migratory Bird Wetland Program projects."

The Montana Wild Sheep Foundation Executive Director Ty Stubblefield shared. "We commend the State Land Boards partnership with FWP and private landowners to conserve key habitat and increase public access through the habitat conservation lease program. Private landowners have played a crucial role in the conservation of many wildlife species here in Montana. It truly is a worthy investment for the future of Montana's wildlife, habitat and farming and ranching."

Like most FWP programs, HCLs also increase public access for public hunting and other wildlife-related recreation.

Increasing public access to public lands is a top priority for the governor. Since the governor took office, Montanans gained access to more than 100,000 acres of public lands through

new WMAs in the Big Snowy Mountains, Bad Rock Canyon, and along the Yellowstone River with expanded access at Mount Haggin, and a new state park at Somers Beach.

### **FWP** Issues Decision **Notice To Adopt Draft EA To Renew Intake Management Agreement**

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks has issued a Decision Notice to adopt as final the Draft Environmental Assessment to renew a management agreement with the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Reclamation for management and operations of Intake Fishing Access Site (FAS) 16 miles north of Glendive on Highway 16.

The Intake FAS operated on a 50-year agreement that historically included two parcels: (1) The 'Intake Area' north of the river and (2) 'Joe's Island' south of the river. The Intake Area includes a boat ramp, day use area, campground, and potable water system. Joe's Island is a primitive area with no infrastructure. The proposed new Management Agreement would be for 50 years and include the Intake Area. Joe's Island would not be included and would revert to Bureau of Reclamation management.

FWP prepared a Draft EA that was available for public review and comment from July 23-Aug. 7 on FWP's Public Notice webpage: https://fwp.mt.gov/news/public-notices, by individual request, and through notice to identified interested parties. FWP did not receive comments during the public comment period.

This management agreement would allow FWP to continue daily operations and management of Intake FAS. The site receives 20,000 visits per year, with the heaviest use during paddlefish season (May-June). FWP would continue to operate and maintain Intake FAS, including the campground, boat ramp, picnic area and associated infrastructure that FWP has constructed over the last 50 years. Joe's Island would be excluded from the agreement as it sees very low use, is difficult to access and is in the flood zone.

Big game hunters should note the 2024 chronic wasting disease proclamation for baiting and transportation requirements for deer, elk and moose as a precaution against the spread of chronic wasting disease.

Noteworthy items include:

Deer gun hunting unit 2B is removed from the list of units where baiting is restricted after the minimum sampling requirement was met with no positive detections.

No new units have been added to the baiting restriction list for 2024-25.

Hunters are prohibited from transporting into North Dakota the whole carcass or parts, except the lower-risk portions, of deer, elk, moose or other members of the cervid family harvested outside of North Dakota.

State Game and Fish Department officials will conduct surveillance of the state by region on a four-year rotation. This year, the CWD surveillance effort will consist of deer gun units in northeastern North Dakota. Outside of this area, hunters can still have their animal tested by taking it to a Game and Fish district office, any deer head collection site (primarily located in the surveillance area) or using a mailin self-sampling kit. A unit outside the annual surveillance zone is still eligible to have a baiting restriction removed if the sampling goal is met, or can be added as a restricted unit if a positive is found.

# **West Nile Virus Detected In Mosquitoes**

DPHHS urges Montanans to take extra care to avoid mosquito bites

State and local health officials are reporting the first Montana West Nile virus (WNV) detections for summer 2024 in mosquitoes across four counties.

Six mosquito pools in Blaine, Dawson, Prairie,

and Wibaux counties have tested positive for WNV. Detection in mosquitoes is an early indicator that activity is increasing within the state, putting humans at higher risk of illness. Historically, Montana identifies the first human and/or horse WNV cases of the year within about two weeks of detecting WNV in mosquitoes.

"Now is the time to take action against WNV if you haven't already started thinking about mosquito bite prevention this season," said DPHHS Vectorborne Disease Epidemiologist Devon Cozart. "Infection can result in minor or severe illness, including death. Even minor forms of infection can leave individuals feeling ill and fatigued for weeks."

Infections can occur in humans after a bite from an infected Culex mosquito. Increased risk of transmission to humans is expected to continue through October – or as long as mosquitoes are active in the state.

Most people who become infected with WNV will not experience symptoms, but 1 in 5 experience minor illness causing headache, rash, body aches, joint pains, fatigue, vomiting, and diarrhea. Fatigue and body aches may persist for weeks following infection.

About 1 in 150 human infections result in severe disease, referred to as neuroinvasive West Nile. Neuroinvasive West Nile can cause neurological symptoms including disorientation, stupor, coma, paralysis, vision loss, and convulsions. WNV can be fatal or lead to long-term neurological complications such as paralysis.

Currently, there is no vaccine or targeted medication for WNV in humans, aside from supportive care.

Horses can also be infected with WNV. Horse owners may contact their veterinarian to obtain an annual vaccine to protect against WNV.

Preventing mosquito bites is important while spending time outdoors in the summer, especially during dusk and dawn, which are peak feeding activity times for female Culex mosquitoes. Permethrin is an insect repellent that can be utilized to treat clothing and gear, including tents. The Environmental Protection Agency search tool is helpful for identifying the appropriate EPA-approved insect repellent that can be applied directly to the skin.

Mosquitoes that carry WNV rarely travel more than one mile from where they breed.

To keep mosquitoes away from homes, it's important to regularly empty standing water at least once per week. For items such as rain barrels, a screen can be applied to the opening to restrict mosquito access. Check out the 4 Ds of mosquito bite prevention below for other mosquito bite prevention tips.

The 4 Ds of Mosquito Bite Prevention:

DEET: Use insect repellent containing effective ingredients such as DEET or picaridin. To verify the effectiveness of insect repellent, go to the EPA's website: https://www.epa. gov/insect-repellents

Drain: Drain standing water around the house to prevent mosquito breeding.

Dawn/Dusk: Mosquitoes are most active during dawn and dusk. Stay inside or take extra precautions to prevent mosquito bites during these times. If doors or windows are left open in the summer, make sure they're fitted with a screen to keep mosquitos out of the house.

Dress: When possible, wear long-sleeved shirts and pants to protect against bites.

# Deer Archery Season Opens

By ND Fish & Game North Dakota's deer bow season opens Aug. 30 at noon and continues through Jan. 5, 2025.

Bowhunters can buy a license online at the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov, or at vendors linked to the department's online licensing system.

Hunters should plan accordingly and allow for time to receive their tag in the mail, as the tag will arrive by postal mail and not over the counter while the customer waits. This applies while purchasing a bow license at a license vendor, or at the Game and Fish Department's main office in Bismarck. The bow tag will be mailed the next business day after the license is purchased.

All archery hunters must have a bow tag in possession before hunting.

Hunters should refer to the 2024 deer hunting guide for season information and regulations.

### ND Fall Turkey Season Set

The fall turkey season is set with 4,545 licenses available to hunters, 110 more than last year.

Applicants can apply online by visiting the North Dakota Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov. The deadline is Sept. 4.

Only North Dakota residents are eligible to apply in the first lottery.

The fall wild turkey season runs from Oct. 12- Jan. 5, 2025.
