


As far as adventure, few places in the United States offer the abundance of wildlife than can be seen in the MonDak area. Take advantage of our recreation opportunities including hiking, bird watching, fishing, hunting, and agate hunting while you're in town. Enjoy the two rivers in our area: the Yellowstone River and the

Missouri River. We are particularly well known for our legendary fishing, especially fishing for the prehistoric Paddlefish.

The MonDak culture is deeply rooted in history including the Lewis and Clark Expedition and Native American trading posts. By making just a short drive across the North Dakota border, visitors can observe the preservation of Fort Union and Fort Buford. During the 1800s, Fort Union was the key fur trade post on the Upper Missouri River. There were more than 25,000 buffalo robes and \$100,000 worth of items traded annually at Fort Union. During the middle of June each year, Fort Union's extremely popular Rendezvous takes place, which features a variety of period arts, crafts and music.

Fort Buford, meanwhile, offers remnants of a frontier military post built in 1866. Fort Buford still features a stone powder magazine, the post cemetery site and large officers' quarters. Nearby Fort Buford is the Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center that provides the history of the confluence, another site on the Lewis and Clark Expedition.






# MonDak Heritage Center

#### Sidney, MT

The MonDak Heritage Center (MDHC) is eastern Montana's premier museum! With a mission to engage, educate, and inspire the community by preserving and contributing to the area's arts, culture, and heritage, MDHC offers many unique activities, experiences, and resources for local residents and visitors of all ages.

The museum features multiple exhibit galleries showcasing regional and national traveling exhibitions and annual art shows. The annual shows include: the Youth Art Show in March highlighting works from regional 7th–12th grade students; the Quilt and Needlework Show in September, full of vibrant colors and amazing designs; and the Miniature Art Show in November-January drawing entries in tiny scale from across the country.


MDHC also features the MonDak "Main Street" history exhibit. Go back in time, and experience eastern Montana and western North Dakota through stories, artifacts, and photographs highlighting local culture, work, and life in the area while strolling down "Main Street".

Highlights include replicas of Sidney National Bank; Dore, ND Post Office, a homestead shack, train depot, doctor's office, saddle shop, Governor Nutter's office, and other displays.

The MDHC permanent collection consists of local and regional art, including early works of famed western artist J. K. Ralston. The MonDak offers resources and opportunities for researchers and genealogists to discover new stories. The MDHC archives and Lillian Anderson Jensen Memorial Library house an extensive collection of manuscripts, photographs, newspapers, and other historical resources.



The MonDak Heritage Center has a great gift shop that offers a large selection of art, jewelry, books, souvenirs and more from local artists and jewelers and regional authors.



discover why Richland County is renowned for its gastronomic delights.



On Aug. 3, the fairgrounds will resonate








# Sidney Country Club

Sidney is home to the only 18-hole golf course in northeastern Montana and everyone is welcome to come and play! The course was started in 1929 as a 9-hole course, with volunteers providing the upkeep. The back nine was added in 2000, with a full maintenance team ensuring that the regulation course is in perfect condition. A golf professional is available to teach lessons, and a fully stocked pro shop provides everything you might need. Kids from 4-18 years old are encouraged to take part in the Jr. golf program, which runs every Wednesday morning May 29 - July 24.

Memberships are available at Sidney Country Club, however, the general public is more than welcome. Green fees are \$40 for 9 holes and \$65 for 18. Carts and clubs are available to rent. Carts rent by the seat at \$13 for 9 holes and \$18 for 18. There is also a driving range, where you can just relax and hit a bucket of balls.

The club is open from 7 a.m. until dark through Labor Day, shorter hours during the fall, so there's ample opportunity for fun.


Whether you golf or not, the Sidney Country Club provides the perfect setting for lunch or dinner at The Fringe restaurant. The Fringe offers weekday lunches from 11 a.m.-2 p.m., unique pub style food Sunday-Thursday. The restaurant is open for lunch and dinner seven days a week during the golf season. A kid's menu is also available. Crunched for time? You can also call ahead for take-out.

A full bar, which opens at 9 a.m. daily, compliments the restaurant. Groups large and small can be accommodated with privacy; with offsite service also available. The Fringe is also open, with limited hours, during the off-season.



# Sidney's Parks And Recreation Offer Something For Everyone

Life under the Big Sky definitely lends itself to outdoor recreation, and the Sidney community provides a variety of outdoor recreation during the warmer months. The City of Sidney has spent considerable time and energy upgrading Water Tower Park, Quilling's Park, Lalonde Park, Johnson Park, Kling Park, Lyndale Park and the South Meadow Softball Complex in recent years.

Water Tower Park received new fencing with funds that Sidney Park Superintendent Stephanie Ridl received from a Richland County recreation grant. Quilling's Park has been equipped with new ADA compliant playground equipment, which includes an agility-based gym for ages 2-12, new swings, two spring-ride surfers, and the popular climbing wall called the Matterhorn. ADA compliant ground cover was also put in which makes the playground more accessible to wheelchairs and strollers and benches that give parents and caregivers a place to sit near the playground.

Lalonde Park received new swings, a Tenspin, and play gym, donated by the Kringen family in memory of Randy Kringen. Continued efforts to improve the amenities in Veterans Memorial Park funded through Ridl's Take Part in Our Park project have raised enough money to cover the cost of an ADA compliant ramp up to the Anderson Pavilion amphitheater, as well as the installation of a concrete pad for the donated benches and new garbage can surrounds.

In the fall of 2018, Kling Park's playground equipment was removed and the installation of the new toddler park structures

as well as a regulation size basketball court commenced. These upgrades were completed in April 2019. The new playground equipment focuses on children ages 2-5 and consists of a play gym, new swings including the Generation Swing, and free play climbing boulders (appropriate for 2–5-year-olds). Johnson Park received much needed upgrades to the children's playground in 2022 and 2023. The installation of new swings, cube structure, ADA compliant ground cover and border system, and a new slide donated by Kraken Oil, have been well received. Also in Johnson Park, the introduction of the Elevate Adult Fitness Course in 2020 has provided a fun new twist to playground equipment.

The final phase of the Sherry Arnold Fitness Trail has been completed. This trail lies over an irrigation lateral that runs through town connecting West Side Elementary School and Sidney High School (a distance of 2.1 miles/3.38 kilometers), along with several Sidney attractions such as the downtown business district, the recently renovated tennis court facility, Hunter Dehner Memorial Skate Park, Svarre Municipal Pool, Moose Park baseball field, Veterans Memorial Park, Sidney's Arboretum, and Johnson Park. Additionally, Richland County continued this vital trail onto county property that extends access to the Richland County Fairgrounds and Sidney Country Club (a distance of 0.57 miles/0.92 kilometers).

Svarre Municipal Pool is another fixture of the community offering swimming lessons, open swim, adult swim, canoeing, lifeguard training, snorkeling, aqua aerobics when available, a splash deck, and waterslides. The pool is also equipped with an ADA compliant lift and approved steps. The pool is located on the corner of 7th Ave. SW and 6th St. SW, Sidney.

# Sidney Health Center



Sidney Health Center is a not-for-profit community based medical center that has been serving people in the MonDak region for more than 100 years. The passion for caring is shared by the doctors, nurses, and several hundred employees and volunteers. This commitment to service excellence is guided by Sidney Health Center's mission, "to help you achieve their highest level of health and well-being."

Located in the heart of Richland County, the attractive Eastern Montana campus includes an acute care (25-bed) hospital, clinic area, cancer care center, certified sleep center, retail pharmacy and an extended care facility offering a complete range of services from birth through end-of-life. These primary areas are complemented by several outpatient services including radiology, laboratory and rehab services to name a few.

Sidney Health Center continues to invest in renovating and updating the facility. Through the years, renovations have included the addition of a new inpatient/outpatient surgery department, expanding the intensive care unit as well as transitioning inpatient rooms from semi-private to private.

Other significant improvements have included expanding the outpatient cancer care treatment services to include radiation therapy with the addition of a TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation therapy treatment system, which is one of the most advanced cancer treatment systems in the area. Since then, the cancer care center has seen significant growth and went through three remodels to accommodate the demand for treating medical and radiation oncology patients including the addition of hyperbaric oxygen therapy.

In 2022, Sidney Health Center broke ground on a \$4.8 million renovation to its emergency department with the expansion of a new ambulance garage. The entire project included four phases and was completed in late 2023. The ED renovation was designed to enhance the patient experience for those requiring emergent medical treatment with privacy, safety and quality of care at the forefront. Special features of the renovation include: three-stall ambulance garage with one stall dedicated to incoming ambulances as a patient drop-off point, seven private treatment bays including one trauma unit and two treatment rooms for respiratory-related illnesses, and a separate ED waiting area including a patient triage area to evaluate patients upon arrival.

Sidney Health Center also relocated the rehabilitation services including cardiac and pulmonary rehab into a newly remodeled space in July 2022. The new construction features a private outside entrance, large windows, and a spacious workout area for patients who have been referred to one of the rehabilitation programs including physical, occupational, speech, or cardiac and pulmonary services. The move not only accommodated the growth of the rehabilitation programs but made room for expansion in other areas in the future.

In 2019, Sidney Health Center completed a multi-phase remodel at the clinic to accommodate more medical providers and create a more efficient utilization of space to better serve patients. The remodel featured a consolidated primary care clinic as well as improvements to the specialty suites.

The clinic area is attached to the hospital for convenient access to the clinic pharmacy and outpatient services. Thirty physicians and specialists offer family medicine, internal medicine, pediatric care, medical oncology, radiation oncology, interventional pain management, pathology, aesthetic medicine, emergency care, hospital inpatient care and surgical services including general, orthopedic, podiatric foot and ankle, obstetrics/gynecology and ear/nose/throat. In addition, 12 mid-level providers, an audiologist and certified registered nurse anesthetists help round out the team. Several specialists visit on a regular basis to see patients in the following categories: cardiology, neurology, and urology.

As mentioned, Sidney Health Center has a nursing home facility on campus. Extended Care is a not-for-profit long-term care health agency providing various levels of skilled nursing care for elderly and physically disabled residents. The facility offers skilled nursing, intermediate care, respite and short stays, rehabilitation, adult day service, and specialized dementia care. Extended Care's goal is to eliminate the three plagues of long-term care institutions: loneliness, helplessness, and boredom. The staff looks upon each person as unique and constantly strives to meet the needs of the body, mind, and spirit.




Downtown Fairview is always alive with music and catching up with old friends, so plan to stay for the evenings as well.








# Snowden Bridge

#### Located North of Fairview, MT



#### The historic Snowden Bridge spans the Missouri River ten miles north of Fairview, MT

The historic Snowden Bridge spans the Missouri River ten miles north of Fairview, MT

Used until 1986, it was likely the only bridge left in the country that accommodated both rail and vehicular traffic. It is also one of the few vertical-lift bridges in the country. This bridge differs from the common drawbridge in that an entire section would lift to allow river boat traffic to pass underneath. The last time Snowden's nearly 300 ft. span was raised occurred in 1935 to allow passage of a freight boat carrying materials for Fort Peck Dam. Engineers designed the most unusual aspect of the bridge, the lift span, so counter weights and accompanying machinery could be moved to other sections of the bridge should the navigation channel shift.

The boat ramp has not yet been replaced after the ice jams a couple of years ago. However, vehicle access to the bridge has been restored.

Snowden Bridge has a sister bridge that spans the Yellowstone River near Fairview.





## Fairview Bridge

Located East of Fairview, MT



The majestic Fairview Bridge and Cartwright Tunnel provide a wonderful walk down the path of history. Scan the Talking Trails QR code in the ad on page 1 of this booklet, or at the site for a detailed description of this remarkable undertaking.

Located just four miles east of Fairview, MT, access the bridge through Sundheim Park, which features a boat ramp, picnic tables and toilets. A paved ramp to a parking area and the bridge provides easy accessibility for everyone.


As you walk high above the Yellowstone River, take in the beauty of the surrounding area, as well as the workings of this amazing lift bridge. The rails have been removed and a walking surface added, plus it is fenced for safety. Then explore the incredible craftsmanship of the Cartwright Tunnel. Make sure you take a flashlight, it gets really dark in there!


The bridge spans the Yellowstone River in North Dakota. It is a vertical lift structure built for rail and vehicular traffic as part of a plan by the Great Northern Railroad for its never-completed Montana Eastern Railway. The only time the lift spans were raised was in 1914 shortly after completion. The bridge, unused since 1986, stretches 1320 feet across the river and hangs about 100 feet above the water.

The bridge adjoins the only tunnel in North Dakota. Construction crews built the 1458-foot-long Cartwright Tunnel in 1912 and 1913, doing the digging by hand. Horse and mule drawn scrapers and blasting powder were used in building the approaches.




#### Makoshika State Park

#### Glendive, MT

Montana's largest state park features badland formations and the fossil remains of Tyrannosaurus Rex, Triceratops, and other prehistoric life. You'll find a visitor center at the park entrance at 1301 Snyder St., Glendive, MT, with interpretive exhibits great for all ages.

The name Makoshika (Ma-ko'-shi-ka) is a variant spelling of a



Lakota phrase meaning 'bad land' or 'bad earth'. Today, as Montana's largest state park, the badlands of Makoshika are set aside for visitors to see and enjoy. In addition to the pine and juniper studded badland formations, the park also houses many fossil remains.

Our visitor center (with a gift shop) at the park entrance, is open 7 days a week 9 a.m.- 5 p.m. May 1-Sept. 30. The park is open from

7 a.m.-10 p.m. Visitor Center winter hours are Oct. 1-April 30, Wed.-Sun. 10 a.m.-4 p.m. The park is open year-round and the visitor center houses a Triceratops and Tyrannosaurus Rex fossil along with other fossil remains and badland interpretive displays. Find out more about Montana paleontology exhibits and activities at Montana Dinosaur Trail.

Included within the park are scenic drives, hiking trails, 28 camping sites, a group picnic area, and an outdoor amphitheater.

The park offers special events throughout the year, including Montana Shakespeare in the Park, Friday night campfire programs and youth programs in summer, and the famous Buzzard Day festival, the second Saturday in June, featuring 10k & 5k races, a fun run, jumping house, food, disc golf tournament, hikes and more!

Visitors are asked not to bring metal detectors, and no digging, collecting, or removal of fossils and artifacts is allowed.

#### Richland Park

#### Sidney, MT

Richland Park has been a long-standing fixture of Richland County, and has seen plenty of changes over the years. The park received new playground equipment including monkey bars, swings, a climbing rock and a 64' Zip Cruise. The Zip Cruise is the first in the county and is popular for all ages.

Not only did the Richland
County Commissioners get involved but Pheasants Forever and Walleyes

Unlimited became instrumental in the past years.

Richland Park is located at 35352 County Road 128, 2 miles east of MT Hwy. 200. In 2006, a boat ramp and an access road to the park were constructed, vaulted toilets were built and Walleyes Unlimited funded a perimeter fence. The area was cleared of over-grown and dead trees and approximately 200 trees were planted.

A Sidney Chamber Leadership Class donated the "Richland Park" rock at the entrance/exit of the park. The foundation of the cook-shack was reused to build the picnic shelter. A wood-fired BBQ and



smoker, campsites with electricity plus handicapped accessible picnic tables are free and open to the public. Firewood must be furnished for the BBQ and fire pits. Clean up is required for the use of campsites.

Informational kiosks were built, a disc golf course was installed, a milelong nature trail plus fishing access and over-night camping is available with a 72-hour permit from the Sidney Law Enforcement Center.

Pets are allowed.

Whether looking for a place to host an outdoor event, get out on the water, out in nature or just get a little way out of town, take a day to go and play at Richland Park.



# Lambert Historical Society

#### Lambert, MT

With hard work and dedication, the citizens from the Lambert area opened the Lambert Museum in 1977. The museum's historical exhibits depict the town's early beginnings. It also honors former Montana Governor Donald Nutter, Lambert native, born in 1915. The museum showcases the Lambert area's heritage including a complete kitchen, a barbershop, a post office, a country school display, an old country church, a complete safflower display from Alfred Rehbein, and a blacksmith shop that features antique saddles and a locally made harness dating back to 1917. Local brands decorate the museum walls.

The Early Media exhibit includes items from Lambert's original printing office. Citizens are particularly



proud of a piece of artwork created by local artist Pamela Cayer Drewry that depicts the Three Buttes, a nearby landmark. Visitors can also inspect a working antique weaving loom, used to create rugs.

Two new exhibits are the Veterans Exhibit that features military uniforms from World War I to present day, there are also numerous artifacts from Fort Union in the exhibit. The other new exhibit is the millinery shop that features hats of all eras, beautiful ball gowns, homemade baby clothes from the early homesteaders and a store bought Traveling Suit worn by one of the single women who came

out to homestead.

The Historical Society also added the Burgess Garage, located across the street from the museum. The garage features a Country Craft Store with a variety of items made by local artisans, a second-hand store and many other exhibits from the museum including a dinosaur bone display, old-fashioned buggies and sleighs along with antique machinery. The Bur-

gess Garage is a Montana Historical Site.

# Richey Historical Museum

#### Preserving The History Of A Small Town

Richey got its roots when the railroad came to town in 1916 and named the town after Postmaster Clyde Richey who homesteaded here in the late 1800s. The Richey Historical Society was established in 1970 and by 1973 the hope of a local museum was realized when enough money



had been raised to purchase the Holzworth Building on Main Street. This was the museum's first building. With a lot of volunteer help from the community, the museum was ready for the grand opening on Oct. 5, the very same year.

Unique to the Richey Museum are items and artifacts that once belonged to the early homesteaders of the area and businesses of the small community dating back to the 20th century.

The Richey Museum and Historical Society now consists of seven buildings that proudly display over thousands of articles documenting local history. With the vast expanse of items in each building, you won't want to be in a rush when visiting. You may want to plan a little extra time to enjoy your journey down memory lane. Everything has been donated by local families and businesses, including the six buildings that have been added after the purchase of the main building. The outlying buildings include a homestead shack, general store, Lisk Creek School/Catholic Church, First National Bank of Richey/Post Office, Richey jail and an outhouse.

Visitors can expect to find walls of local community photos as well as sport photos. Items ranging from a homestead kitchen, clothing from years gone by, to a printing press from Richey's first newspaper, "The Richey Pilot". The original fire bell (used 1916-1945) is on display in the front yard and a brand board located behind the main building has the brands of area farmers and ranchers. We have a 1930s Ford Model A car (called the puddle jumper) that steals the interest of many visitors. This high-wheeled car was used to deliver

mail to rural areas during the winter months. It is housed in the back room of the main museum. In the basement of the main building, you will find an array of household items, clothing over 100 years old, a refurbished wishing well, a sheep hut with a chore girl, Aggie, ready to feed the baby lambs. The Lisk Creek School/Catholic Church building has been divided into three sections. The church section offers memorabilia from our local churches, a second section is dedicated to the area schools and the third section; a small library of old school books and an area dedicated to the local VFW Club.

Visitors have traveled from across the country to learn more about their family history and to visit the area where their relatives may have grown up. With all the items the museum has to offer, you will surely find something that will make a connection to your family. Richey is a small town committed to preserving the history of the area.

The Richey Museum and Historical Society is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1-4 p.m. beginning May 28 and closing Aug. 29. There are no admission fees to visit our museum, but donations are greatly appreciated. Our Centennial Book, "The Long Road Home" is available at a cost of \$50 per book plus postage if mailed.

#### Montana Moss Agate





Many, many years ago T-Rex was king and Eastern Montana was mostly a shallow inland ocean, almost a swamp with huge forests

in the rock. Like that Native American, modern man marvels at the beauty found in this agate and works to unlock its hidden secrets.

lining its shores and islands of volcanoes spewing forth lava to entomb parts of the forest in lava and ash. The bowels of Yellowstone bulged, roared and flowed mountains of lava that decimated thousands of acres of mighty redwoods and sequoias for hundreds of miles around. This decimation continued for hundreds of years with layer upon layer of forests growing up and then being driven down under the ponderous weight of all the mega-tons of lava and ash. The hot lava devoured most of the wood in its rush to cover the trees, but some of the shape ingredients of the limbs remained trapped in the cooling lava.


When the time of volcanoes and lava was subdued and the rains came, mineral laden silica water flowed into the cavities and pockets left by the dying trees and bubbling lava. As flow after flow slowly filled the pockets with chalcedony, Montana Agate was born.

Scenic Montana Moss Agate - splashed with color bands of red, amber, brown and sprinkled with dendrites of black and red is one of the two Montana state gemstones and is one of the finest agate in the world. Found in some abundance in the alluvial gravels of the Yellowstone River, it is the agate form of quartz and has a hardness of seven.

The first man to find beauty in the Montana Agate nodules that are strewn about in the alluvial gravels of the Yellowstone River, was likely a Native American, hundreds if not thousands of years ago. He marveled at the colors and transparency of the agate and as he cleaved off slivers in an attempt to make scrapers and arrowheads, revealed scenes and pictures that were hidden



# The Calbertson Museum



Have you wondered what it was like to step back in time to the days of the old west, when the land was untamed and brave pioneers carved out a piece of land, where frontier doctors practiced medicine, school teachers taught lessons to multiple-aged children in a one-room schoolhouse, and cowboys sat around a campfire swapping stories? These things can be experienced in the Culbertson Museum. Where you can learn what life was like from the 1890s to the 1940s through a series of displays and a wide variety of artifacts that will make you feel as though you are right back there with the frontier legends.

The museum has been open for over 30 years and continues "preserving the past for the future." From its beginning, volunteers have dedicated their time in setting up rooms that display the feel of old Montana throughout the years. Inside the museum, displays depict an early days parlor, a homestead and summer kitchen, a schoolhouse, barber and beauty shop, a saloon, a church, and doctor's office and a pharmacy.

Outside, visitors can see inside a blacksmith's shop, stagecoach, and early days farm equipment and fire trucks. In addition, they have a 1896 Sterling wood threshing machine, one of two in North America. Young and old, alike, can learn something about Montana history. The museum is located on Highway 2 E of Culbertson and opens May 13. The hours are Mon.-Sat. 9 a.m.-4 p.m. and Sun. noon-4 p.m. There is no admission fee, but donations are greatly appreciated. 

You won't want to be in a rush when you visit the Buffalo Trails Museum located in Epping, ND. This seven-building complex features area history starting in prehistoric times and continuing through the homestead era. The museum highlights exhibits made by the first curator and founder, Elmer Halvorson. These fascinating displays include painting, dioramas, and life-sized human figures posed in scenes from the past. Some of the favorite exhibits include a reconstruct-

ed Assiniboine village, a pioneer home scene, fossils and a diorama called an Indian Tree Burial. The museum will be open this summer.

## Maah Daah Hey Trail

#### Discover the Beauty of the Rugged Badlands

The Maah Daah Hey Trail System showcases some of the country's most unique and breathtaking terrain. Majestic plateaus, jagged peaks and valleys, large expanses of rolling prairie, and rivers intertwine to offer the adventurous outdoors enthusiast a taste of pure, unadulterated wilderness.

The Maah Daah Hey Trail System is comprised of nine trail units of varying size and difficulty. From north to south, they are the Wolf, 8.8 miles; Long X, 5.8 miles; Summit, 3.8 miles; Overlook, 0.3 miles; Maah Daah Hey, 144 miles; Bennett, 3.2 miles; Cottonwood, 6.9 miles; Ice Cave, 1.5 miles; and Buffalo Gap, 18.9 miles.

The trail system features nearly every type of terrain found in western North Dakota. This varies from grassy flats and ridges to very rough steep clay badlands buttes with everything in between, including river bottoms and wooded draws to rolling prairie.

There are 11 developed campgrounds on the Maah Daah Hey Trail System: CCC, Bennett, Buffalo Gap, Burning Coal Vein, Coal Creek, Cottonwood, Elkhorn, Magpie, Sully Creek, Summit, and Wannagan. Three of these campgrounds have a limited number of reservable sites. They are Buffalo Gap, Cottonwood and Sully Creek.

Trail registers indicate foot use (hiking, backpacking & running) accounts for about 70% of the use, mountain bike use at 24% with the remaining 6% as horseback.

This area of North Dakota provides prime habitat for a variety of mammals and birds. Mule and whitetail deer, antelope, prairie dogs, and coyotes are often sighted, while an occasional golden eagle, red tail hawk, or prairie falcon may be spotted soaring above. Bighorn sheep and elk have been reintroduced into the area and can be spotted by keen observers especially near CCC campground on the north end of the trail. In addition, bison and feral horses roam the range in Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

The Maah Daah Hey Trail crosses the Little Missouri River in two places, Elkhorn Crossing and Sully Crossing. Water height varies with weather conditions. Knutson Creek, a slow meandering creek most of the year is crossed by both the Maah Daah Hey Trail and the Buffalo Gap Trail. The bottom of this creek is very muddy so subsurface puncheons have been constructed that will support the weight of trail users. Posts on each side of the banks marks the path of the crossing.

The symbol for the trail is the turtle. Adopted from the Lakota Sioux Indians, the turtle symbolizes patience, loyalty, determination, steadfastness, long-life and fortitude. The turtle shell symbolizes protection and its effigy is emblazoned on the posts that mark the trail.



View an old 1904 Cadillac, an old steamboat lantern, and artifacts of arrowheads, Mastodon teeth, Civilian Conservation Corp and much more. The

## Lewis And Clark Trail Museum

Winter is the time to work! We have had many projects taking place at the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum over the winter.

Several new and continued projects are happening now. We have recently completed renovations to several of our rooms and displays. As always, the maintenance of a building over 110 years old is continual. Join us this summer to explore the many changes happening at the museum.

We have a great display featuring information about the "End of the Rope" movie that was filmed in McKenzie County and tells the story about Charles Bannon and the grisly murders of a family of six from Schafer, ND. Come and check out the display!

A continued project from three summers ago was the establishment of the Pollinator Habitat Project. This is an ongoing venture. It started with a joint project between the NRCS, and the McKenzie County Chapters of Pheasants Forever. The Outdoor Heritage Fund, which provided monies to fund projects that enhance conservation practices in the state, has awarded a grant for this project's funding. Pheasants Forever is a non-profit organization dedicated to upland habitat conservation. Their mission is to conserve pheasants, quail, and other wildlife through habitat improvements, public access, education, and conservation advocacy.

Pollinators, animals including bees and butterflies, are vitally important. Eight-five percent of plants that flower depend on a pollinator to reproduce. The Monarch and bee population in the U.S. has declined dramatically. In the past few decades, it is estimated there is a 90% loss of the Monarch population. This is one reason



why initiatives such as the Pollinator Habitat Project at the Lewis and Clark Trail Museum is worth celebrating and supporting.


When Lewis and Clark with their Corps of Discovery came through McKenzie County, they could not have known what their endeavors would be the start of. ## Theodore Roosevelt Park

#### North Unit

View the colorful North Dakota Badlands with its sweeping vistas as one of the last remnants of wilderness in the Northern Great Plains.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park memorializes the 26th president for his enduring contributions to the conservation of our natural resources. There are three units of the park. The North Unit, which is located 15 miles south of Watford City, ND on US 85, is open all year long.

Visitors have a unique opportunity for wildlife viewing. In the park you will find open prairie, hardwood draws, bison, deer as well as other wildlife. The park also offers stunning views of the Little Missouri River as it runs through the park and a look into history that includes Theodore Roosevelt's life while living in North Dakota.

A small visitor center is located at the park entrance for visitors to the North Unit. You can speak with a ranger, receive assistance with trip planning needs, obtain a backcountry permit, purchase a souvenir or watch the park film, "Refuge of the American Spirit". Restrooms are available at this location.

The vehicle entrance fee is \$30 for one private, non-commercial vehicle and its occupants for seven days; a motorcycle entrance fee is \$25 for one motorcycle and its riders for seven days; and a non-motorized individual entrance fee is \$15 per-person. This fee grants access for individuals on foot, bicycle, or horseback to all units of Theodore Roosevelt National Park for seven days. An annual pass is \$55.

Juniper Campground is open all year and is available for tents and RVs. There are no hook-ups but a dump station is available during the summer months. Camping fees are charged all year. The summer rate for the campground is \$14 May- Sept.; and the winter rate is \$7 Oct.-April. Group site passes are \$30, by reservation only.

Miles of hiking trails bisects the park, which offer a closer look at the rugged Badlands and the wildlife that call this home. Interpretive programs are offered most days throughout the summer and into the early fall. You can check at the visitor center for a current list.

## Fort Union Trading Post

#### Located 23 miles southwest of Williston, ND

Built near the confluence of the Yellowstone and Missouri rivers between 1828 and 1867, nine Upper Missouri tribes, Assiniboine, Plains Cree, Blackfeet, Plains Ojibwa, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara, Crow and Lakota; annually traded buffalo hides, beaver pelts, and other furs for hundreds of goods imported from eight countries. In exchange for furs that ranged from grizzly bear and bison to mice, tribal trading partners received manufactured materials such as calico cloth, guns and ammunition, clothing, pipes, beads, and cooking ware. On average, the post received more than 25,000 buffalo robes and sold more than \$100,000 in merchandise each year.

The site is operated by the National Parks Service, which partially reconstructed the post to its current appearance. This historic site invites visitors to investigate life as it was in the mid-19th century.

Fort Union is situated 23 miles SW of Williston, ND via Hwy. 1804; and 24 miles NE of Sidney, MT via Hwy. 58. Fort Union is open year-round; 2024 hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. CDT.

#### Fort Buford

#### Located on Highways 1804 & 58, near Williston, ND

Fort Buford was a United States Army Post at the confluence of the Missouri and Yellowstone Rivers in Dakota Territory. Capt. William Rankin, 13th infantry, along with 89 enlisted soldiers, established the fort June 12, 1866. The post was built using adobe bricks and cottonwood enclosed by a 360x360 wooden stockade

Fort Buford was named after Major General John Buford, who fought in the Civil War. During its 29 years as a sentinel, Fort Buford successfully served the river and overland routes for safe passage of immigrants traveling to the gold fields, mail routes, pay wagons and protection of telegraph, railroad, and tribal allies. Fort Buford also served as a primary supply depot for units conducting military field operations against Native Americans in the region.

During the first years, the soldiers endured frequent Hunkpapa skirmishes, keeping them near prisoners. The Hunkpapas, led by Sitting Bull, successfully attacked soldiers on work details, hunting parties and civilian groups.

In 1881, Sitting Bull, who had retreated into Canada, after the battle of the Little Big Horn, turned over his rifle at Fort Buford. Sitting Bull made the best choice possible for his people who were starving. During the ceremony in the home of the commanding officer, Major Brotherton, Sitting Bull handed his rifle over to his son, Crow Foot, who handed it to Major Brotherton. This simple act spared the proud Hunkpapa from having to say he surrendered his weapon to the blue coats.

In 1891-1895, the 10th Cavalry and 25th Infantry of the "Buffalo Soldiers," were stationed at Fort Buford. These soldiers policed the Canadian and United States boundary; guarded railway construction crews and provided escorts for pay wagons, steamboats, and wagon trains.

Restored to their original condition, three original buildings remain on site: Field Officer's Quarters, Powder Magazine, and Office of the Guard. The reproduction Barracks was completed in 2004. The Masonic site (west of the Field Officer's Quarters) was dedicated in 2014 by the Yellowstone Historic Lodge #88 and the Eureka Lodge #135. The Buffalo soldier horse statue, created by artist Jim Dolan, was dedicated at the site in 2016.

Every year in July, the Fort Buford 6th Infantry Association, a local living history organization, holds an encampment at Fort Buford. Come on out and visit with the soldiers and see how they live. Every October, a cemetery walk is held to share the stories of those spirits that remain at the fort. Volunteers dress up portraying soldiers and civilians who had died at the fort and tell their story. The 2024 date for the Encampment is Saturday, May 8. The Ghost Walk is Saturday evening, October 19.



## Cut Bluff Overlook

Conveniently located on Highway 1804 just to the east of Williston, ND, Cut Bluff Overlook marks the spot where Lewis and Clark once stood during their epic journey to the Pacific Ocean and back.

Visitors can soak up the scenery and the history of the site where there is a memorial to Lewis and Clark, a kiosk explaining the significance of the site, a covered shelter and picnic area, camping sites, a vault toilet and a walking trail.

The Louisiana Purchase of 1803, which included the western half of the Mississippi basin from the river to the Rocky Mountains, sparked president Thomas Jefferson to send the following missive to Meriwether Lewis: "The object of your mission is to explore the Missouri River, and such principle stream of it, as, by its course and communication with the waters of the Pacific Ocean, whether the Columbia, Oregon, Colorado or any other river may offer the most

direct and practicable water communication across this continent for the purpose of commerce." Lewis brought in William Clark and the pair, with their support staff, made the arduous journey, leaving Ft. Mandan in the spring of 1805 and returning to St. Louis, MO, in September 1806.

With its easy access and peaceful surroundings, Cut Bluff Overlook is well worth a visit.

#### Spring Lake Park, The Jewel Of Williston ND



#### "Preserving History, Promoting Art, Enhances Community"

The James Memorial Art Center operates in Williston's original library building that opened on Feb. 27, 1911.

According to the James Memorial website, the idea for a local library started in 1909 when 80 women gathered in Williston to organize the Women's Civic League. The group of women petitioned for funds to build the library. Arthur Curtiss James, son of D. Willis James (who Williston was named after) agreed to fund the project as a memorial to his father.


The building was used as the city's library until 1983 when the Williston Community Library replaced it. It remained unused until the early 1990s when Williston was discussing demolishing the building.

A group of community members sought an opportunity to save the building, forming the James Memorial Preservation Society and opening the building up as a visual arts center in 1993. The non-profit organization assumed full financial responsibility for the maintenance and repair of the building and for exhibitions and activities it hosted. In addition to hosting traveling exhibits from artists across the region, the James also showcases several local and area artists in its two galleries. Several special events and art classes for youth and adults are also held throughout the year. Building spaces are also available to rent for special events, parties, and meetings.

Exhibits are always free and open to the public. Visitors are encouraged to check out the James Memorial Art Center at 621 1st Ave. W., Williston. Gallery hours are Monday-Thursday 9 a.m.-3 p.m. and Friday 12-5 p.m. September-April, the gallery is also open Sundays from 1-5 p.m. For more information on the James Memorial Art Center, visit its website at www.thejamesmemorial. org or follow them on Facebook and Instagram.








